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EDITORIAL WINTER/SPRING 98 ISSUE #1

Welcome to the debut editorial and of course the first issue of Canadian Assault magazine!. I guess I should introduce myself to you briefly. My name is Dale Roy. I am 24 yrs old, have long blonde hair, blue eyes, stand shit I am not even totally sure I guess about 5'7. I first got into metal around late 1983/early '84 with bands like Iron Maiden, Venom, W.A.S.P., Twisted Sister, Ozzy and within months started to get onto some heavier stuff. It seems I always was and always will be attracted by heavy as shit music! Like I was saying, I started getting into Hellhammer, Grave Digger, Judas Priest, Mercyful Fate, Obsession and the like. This continued on through the mid to late '80's getting into bands like Celtic Frost, Bathory, Death Angel and quickly onto Carcass, Nocturnus, Morbid Angel, Repulsion and than in late 1989 I picked up a mag I had bought for a while back around '85/86 called Metal Mania and they had an underground demo band column. Needless to say I wrote to some of the bands in there (i.e. Cardinal Sin, State Of Execution ect) and loved what I heard and discovered a great thing with the demos!. Flyers! Hell yeah, I started writing more bands and ordering some zines and was well on my way!. Then, I guess in late 1991 or so, I started to tape trade. I mean I was getting all of this killer underground music that would have cost me a fortune to order all crammed on a few ninety minute tapes. Also, from that I heard loads of new bands and some I loved so much that I had to have the original copies. Moving onto I guess early 1992 I asked a couple zines both just starting out if they needed some help with reviews. Both were into it, so I did a bunch of reviews and sent them off. I was as excited as shit to see my scribes immortalized in pen and ink and read by fellow undergrounders!. However, my excitement was crushed when both turned out to be bullshit and neither was ever to see print. Well, at the time I was having a phone conversation with Mike Campbell, one of my tape traders who also happened to be the editor of a very well respected zine called The Sepulchral Voice. Mike, after hearing my story above, wanted me to start doing reviews and the odd interview for his mag!. I was his tape trader but also a big fan of his mag and I was stoked as shit to have the opportunity such as this. So, I was fully on my way, fully immersed in the underground scene, save for the fact I was not in a band, cause I have very little musical talent, but a ton of dedication and devotion and heart for metal!.

I'll now switch gears and tell you a little about what I am doing with this mag and why I have done things certain ways with it. Well, first off, I am an absolute zineaholic. I order them obsessively and am reading them all the time. I feel the tons of mags I have read over the years has enriched me as a person. I am grateful to each and every person who had a part in making each mag. My addiction to underground's printed word, is one I need no help to cure, I love it. So, as you can see, I am very much into trading with other mags, my issue for yours. Okay onto some things in my years of 'zine reading I know what I like the most about them, how I like them to be layed out and so forth. For example, I hate short interviews. Little fucking half to one full page or not much bigger piss me off. It is so hard to really get into the band, see what makes them tick, hear what they are thinking and feeling; and, you will not get that from a half-page interview. To be honest, in one issue of Metalcore from New York there was like a 9 page interview. Now for some that is overdoing it, but I loved it! No, you won't likely see me doing 10 page interviews; but, hey if I get on a roll with a band have shit is flowing lets make the fucker 15 pages!. Another pet peeve is I like the interviews and pages of reviews to be mixed up a little. Using Ill Literature, a mag that is well done but annoys me, as an example. First off, most of the interviews are puny. But they also have all the reviews grouped together. I mean, I absolutely love reading reviews. And, yes, I am a front to back reader. So when in III Literature they have like 30-40 pages of straight reviews, no matter how exciting the reviews may be they are going to drag and get boring. All I am saying is mix shit up a little and you will surely keep your readers attention far better and things will flow nicely. Another thing Keith and I touched on in the Eternal Darkness interview is that I like far better underground mags that keep that DIY underground thing first and foremost. I find I dig mags way more that are done more underground - just photo-copied as long as the contents are well done. That is what I hope to do with Canadian Assault, and no I am not just saying that so I can spend less money. I have enough money saved for this print to print it professionally, but I am choosing to photo-copy it. As it is, I think I may have already overused my new found toy (i.e.- the computer, which I have only had for barely more than a year, and a good part of that time was spent learning how use it ha ha!) and made things a little too slick. I dunno. We will see how it turns out. I fear I have put in too many photos and they will just all come out darker than Chef's ass from South Park ha. I ask that you are patient with me. I am still very heavily in the experimental stages with concerns computer layouts and all that goes with it, I know this mag, when pieced together, will look pretty chaotic. That is due to my messing around with a lot of different layouts, just to see how it looks. I am sure I will settle down with the next couple issues and hit my stride with concerns to that. I hope to get better at this as I go along, so stay tuned, there are more surprises to come and if you like this issue, keep in touch there is more to come and it can only get better from here!. SUPPORT THE UNDERGROUND, LOVE YOUR METAL, BE PROUD OF IT, BE PROUD OF YOURSELF AND LET'S UNITE UNDER ONE METAL BANNER TOGETHER!! METAL ON!!! IN THE WORDS OF CRONOS "HELL YEAH!!". 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This man oozes the underground, he has his hands in nearly every facet of it. Keith strives and works very hard to support the music and the underground, he embraces. His vision and dedication has always been focused and his spirit is the true metal spirit! Help yourself and the underground scene by doing so and write and support Eternal Darkness...

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This is a small collection of some of the flyers I managed to get my hands on over the years. It's kinda cool to look back and see the early stages of the bands and see things the average fan might never come across...

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These 2 pages are a small and humble homage to my favorite band of all time. To their music, to the wonderful memories I have associated with it, also to their attitude and legacy!. One of the first albums I ever purchased was a cassette of "Black Metal", amazingly though battered and weathered by time and over use, the tape plays on, kind of like Venom today and their spirit which will live on forever...

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I must apologize somewhat as many of the reviews are old and that is due to a couple factors. My goal for this issue was to have over 100 reviews, unfortunately I did not receive nearly the amount of promo material I had hoped for. In order to achieve my review goal, I needed to review a lot of items from my personal collection, since I am not rich I could not just order tons o' brand new shit, so that is why some of the reviews are dated a bit. Also to reach my goal I enlisted the help of two friends and underground reviewers Pat Warner of File 13 mag, and Neil St. Laurent of Tracks Of Creation internet 'zine, my thanks go out to them. Also I must mention Kirk Dolbear, my metal brother and the man who runs Cyclonic Enterprises, he hooked me up with a bunch of review material for this issue, hails brol. I hope my reviews are informative, hopefully they give you the reader, a clear idea of what sort of music the band plays, and the quality of the material to help you decide if you like it or whether you should steer clear. Hopefully I can keep up my 100 + review per issue standard for future issues. However I can tell you if I don't get more promo material, that won't happen. It won't be that way from a lack of trying, I plan on sending this issue to just about every major to minor underground label you can think ofl. Also I will absolutely blanket the underground with flyers, I plan to print and spread 8 - 10, 000 of them!. So if I do not reach this goal than that will surely reflect labels and bands disinterest in moving their product, getting their name around and labels pushing their bands and supporting the underground...

Ancient Album Reviews Page # 4

This section focuses on old albums, I consider to be classics and must have's!. I try to keep my picks on more of an obscure level, I mean everyone know "Kill 'Em All" and "Hell Awaits" are classics, so there would be little point to put those here. I point out gems that have been largely overlooked, this is to help new comers and old timers alike, the young fans to check out the forefathers of the metal they worship and the seasoned metalheads on ones they missed or passed over the first time around...



"Fist Held High" 1984 LP (Metal Blade/Banzai Recs.Canada) This American band play an explosive brand of speed metal armageddon. Thrust waves the flag of metal like true warriors - garbed in spiked wrist bands, studs and leather!. I love the guitar sound (courtesy of Bill Metoyer of Metallica, Morbid Angel...fame) on here as Thrust bust out killer riff after riff, chugging along at breakneck speed. The vocalist may be hard for some to get into, due the high range of piercing heights his voice often resides. The metal spirit is alive and proudly displayed on such tracks as: "Metallic Attack", "Heavier Than Hell", "Posers Will Die!", and the title track. A great pounding album and a truly

overlooked and underrated gem!.

JUGGERNAUT -"Baptism Under Fire" 1986 LP (Metal Blade/Restless Records) Power metal reigns down with furies of galloping melodic riffage and resonating drums pounding courtesy of Bobby Jarzombek. When I listen to this record, I get this great rumbling deep in my chest from the driving and heavy darkness that is "Baptism Under Fire"!. My fave track has to be "All Hallow's Eve" which starts off with chainsaw guitar scratching then kicks in with some great rhythms and cool lines such as "In the midst of pagan rites...All hallow's eve spirits rise, On the cold shoulders of an icy abyss...". Punched home by vocalist Harlan Glenn's great laid back, smooth delivery. Superb lead work highlights this classic album. A must

GRAVE DIGGER "Witch Hunter" 1985 LP
(Noise Recs./Banzai Recs.Canada)
From the land of Destruction,
Sodom, Kreator, Rage, and
Halloween comes the mighty Grave
Digger, with one of my favorite
albums of all time!. Some people

have a hard time with heavily accented singers. In this instance, I personally find Chris Boltendahl to be great and soaring and his accent totally infectious. On this outing, Grave Digger crafted some truly great compositions that will keep head banging feverishly, with it's fast pacing, heavy riffing, thundering war drums, catchy framework and it's moving melodies. This LP is a glowing example of what a great power/speed metal album should sound like. Harmonies and melodies abound and the lead guitar work just smokes. All the tunes are good but some stand-outs are: "Night Drifter", "Don't Kill The Children", "Shoot Her Down", "Storming The Brain", and the title track. I can tell you this holds a soft spot in my heart and when this tape gives out from and age and overuse, if I cannot find another or the vinyl, a small piece of me will die with it, but the memories will live on forever!!. Before I go I just have to mention, on the middle section of the opening track, the guitar interplay is so fucking smooth and graceful, you have got to hear it...it leaves my ass in awe!.



ONSLAUGHT-"Power From Hell" 1987 LP (Under One Flag/Combat Recs) Hells yeah! This album rules with an iron fist, loaded up with a ultra killer cover and song are not side A or B but side death and side metal. Onslaught play heavy fucking thrash/ speed/death metal - simple, raw, powerful, catchy and I mentioned heavy as all fuck!. Vocalist Paul M. barks gruffly but clearly, driving an aural assault through such tunes as: "Damnation", "Skullcrusher", "Lord Of Evil", "The Devil's Legion", and "Steel Meets Steel (hmm...that title reminds me of Hammerfall wonder why!?)", to name but a few. Onslaught would never be accused of being a technical band, and I am sure would never want to be!. However, they are guilty of writing memorable and nastily crushing tuneful compos full of evil and rage. Hells yeah!!.



"Metal Rush" 1984 LP (Roadrunner/Attic Recs. Canada) This is a very overlooked, very under-rated, heavy metal band from Denmark. A little known secret is this band features in it's ranks, Hal Patino who went on to play bass on a few King Diamond albums!. This is straight forward power/heavy metal with plenty of balls, lots of metal attitude and killer sing-along choruses that get stuck in your head, like the classic metal anthems they are!. Maltese Falcon are solid top to bottom with killer drum work, catchy, heavy riffing steeped with melody and harmony, superb soloing. The vocals are confident, smooth, deep and are belted out with power and high end range, for emphasis where needed. I would love to see this remastered and put on CD, Europe and Japan would fucking eat this shit up quicker than Cartman does his cheeesy poofs!. Just wait till you hear this band march through tracks such as: "Rats", "Heavy 'N Loud", "Rebellion", "Alive" and the title track. The track "Headbanger" on here is live and, god, I wish I was there! What a commanding band! Just listen to the driving guitars and the main chorus of "We all know how to headbang, And we do it right!". The solo in this track is so awesome man!. Maltese Falcon holds up true the metal spirit. It makes me proud to be a mealhead!!. This probably won't be easy to find, but leave no used record shop or cutout bin unturned. You will love me for it!.







C.A. Mag - Could you tell about the rather unique fashion your "Serenades Of The Damned" demo was recorded and how the recording of it differed from your freshly self-released CD in a real studio!??!. Are you satisfied with the results of both these recordings???.

<u>Valdrihk</u> - The demo was taped live at rehearsal on a DAT system(Yes a DAT walkman!-Dale), with a unique microphone at the center of the room. So, naturally the sound isn't that great (in fact, it seems to had been recorded in a tornado!). Nevertheless, it was a good start besides the countless fucks it contains!!. The album has a much cleaner, professional sound that is by far more pleasant to the ear, due to the fact that it had been recorded through fifteen hours of studio work instead of 3-4 hours of live performance (on the demo).

C.A Mag - I already have eluded to the fact of you just putting out your debut album on CD which is entitled "The Mist Softens My Sorrow"; please tell us about it, where was it recorded and what were the studio and pressing costs for it???. Do you hope a European label will pick up the album for release over there or are you planning to just stick to a lot of small disributions???.

<u>Valdrihk</u> - We recorded at "Studio Le Mur du Son" in Montreal(Canada). The studio work was through in less than fifty hours so it hasn't been quite expensive, about \$1100. We pressed 500 copies for an additional \$2200. Some copies were sent to Evil Omen records and Candlelight, and we're hoping for a positive response regarding future recordings. But for the moment, we mostly count on lesser distributions for European promotion.

<u>C.A. Mag</u> - Upon the conception of the band why was the name Tenebrae chosen and was any thought given to the fact that there is a Finnish band with the same moniker who have released demos, a 7" ep and last year an album???. What are the plans for North American CD distribution and future touring if any???. What can we expect from a Tenebrae live show???.

Valdrihk - The initial members chose this name because it is very representative of our music's essence, nature and lyrical inspiration. Neither I (Valdrihk) nor the first line-up knew that there is another Tenebrae, and we didn't really care as long as it does not interfere with our plans. The two bands are clearly distinguished from one another. We're presently having a distribution deal with Neoblast Productions (Quebec) and a few other local distributors. We are also discussing an eventual quick tour in two or three cities here in Quebec. We get on stage wearing cloaks and armors, sometime sword in hand. Also candelabras, crosses, angels and symbols of Baphomet to add to the visual and theatrical aspect of the show. We may also have a guest vocalist(see the closing answer of this interview to find out the identity of this guest vocalist!-Dale) on stage for female vox or additional vocals.

<u>C.A. Mag</u> - What kind of impact do you hope to have on the underground scene with this new record???. Are you satisfied with the material on it???. Are you happy with the sound and production job???. Some music on the album is the same or roughly the same as some songs or sections of your demo; was the material re-done with new lyrics(and essentially a new identity) in order to sever ties with your former members and their contributions or writings???.

<u>Dabraxas</u> - We did not hope at first to have a certain impact on the scene, besides the satanic propaganda that black metal is for. We recorded it (the CD) because we wanted you to hear those songs with a good sound. If someone else appreciates it, well, that's great!. <u>Valdrihk</u> - We are in general very satisfied of this recording except me, for I am never satisfied of what I done. I hate my lyrics and my vocal performance on this album, but I can tell you the next album will show an impressive improvement. It (the CD) sounds great, at least better than the demo (hey why so down on the demo it had a cool primitive sound and is a classic in my mind!!-Dale) and the sound engineer at "Studio Le Mur du Son" did an incredible job. When I joined Tenebrae, Dabraxas handed me some tapes of songs that the former singer had put lyrics on but had took them with him when he departed. He asked me to write new lyrics, for these are great songs and also because the band has nothing to do with it's ex-singer anymore.

C.A. Mag - I recently got a letter from your ex-singer, where he states he thinks your new material is "a Cradle Of Filth ripoff" and that the reason he left was is in part because you guys wanted the band to be "a cool, friendly black metal band"; what do you think about this, and do you think it's just jealousy or what???. What do you think of his new band and do you still speak with Damaroth???.

<u>Dabraxas</u> - Well, a lot of people seem to think that we are like Cradle Of Filth, but I really don't think so. The only places where it can be similar is the melodic passages of piano and violins. The person who composes our keyboards is Molek, and the only music he listens to is classical music. Yes, I think he's very jealous of us. When he was with Tenebrae, we did 3 songs where he wrote all the lyrics (we kept the songs, but we changed the lyrics); he was really proud of them and he found it was good black metal. But now he departed from the band, he suddenly thinks all his songs are despicable. Another reason why I think he is jealous is that now we are more popular in the underground scene and he can't take it. But mark my words, he will never tell you that!. If he thinks we are a rip-off of Cradle Of Filth, I don't see why his band is more original, or more black metal; it's still amateurish, not to much work (put into it). We also think that he is trying to have a sense of belonging with the black metal attitude like some bands. He absolutely wants

to be associated with it. We don't think you have to live the black metal lifestyle (in black 24 hours a day, hating everyone that does not think like you do, to be only in that world of fantasy, ect...) to be a black metal band. The black metal philosophy is in your soul, not only the dress and all that. We have put aside this; it is narrow-minded and childish. When he'll (Myrkhaal) grow up, he will understand. Tenebrae is open-minded. If the way we are makes us a "cool friendly black metal band", so be it. We have other things to do. We still talk to Damaroth; he has departed for professional reasons.

<u>C.A. Mag</u> - I find in your music the keyboards are a very integral part of your compositions and not just used as many bands to create a false atmosphere to cover up their incompetence with their other instruments, do you agree with this statement???. Also could you describe the overall content of Tenebrae's lyrics???.

<u>Valdrihk</u> - Keyboards are the foundation upon which our music is elaborated. So it fulfills a crucial role as a front instrument, much alike the guitars or vocals, rather than to serve only as a background atmosphere. As for the lyrics, vamprism, solitude, suicide and disgust towards christianity and it's filthy poisoned roots are the main themes tackled in "Serenades..." and "The Mist Softens My Sorrow". The next album will probably be a vampire concept, with Luciferian inspirations and still in both french and english like the last release.

<u>C.A. Mag</u> -What are your fave sci-fi/horror/gore movies???. Fave books and authors???. Which are the best 'zines to the bands in the underground and what is your opinion on the importance of 'zines to the underground in general???. What other mags if any have you done interviews with???. Where do you find most of the band's mail is coming from???.

Valdrihk - We all the classic very big on hollywood sometimes watch gore movie for Ann Rice, Tolkien...a from Baudelaire.

<u>Dabraxas</u> - We they are an obvious especially for them would have wouldn't be of 'zines were filled in for

from France, Poland and the United States. Most of the mail is sent by internet.

<u>C.A. Mag</u> - What is your opinion of the Canadian scene???. What bands do you currently listen to???. What are your all-time fave bands and which ones influenced the beginnings of Tenebrae???.

Valdrihk - We personally think of the Canadian scene as pitiful, especially in Quebec; bands are narrow-minded to Cannibal Corpse/Suffocation grind and closed to anything different. The black metal scene in Montreal is nearly non-existent. Dabraxas and Mathieu listen to atmospheric black metal (Darkwoods My Betrothed, Cradle Of Filth), old rock bands (Genesis, Pink Floyd) and classical as well as Molek. I appreciate bands like Summonings, Isengaard, Gehenna's Ip, but also material ranging from Skinny Puppy to Autumn Tears and also classical medieval orchestrations. Tenebrae's debut weren't influenced by a particular band, but from the black metal scene in general. There are some talks about Tenebrae being influenced by Cradle Of Filth because of our keyboards but Molek doesn't listen to black metal at all. So how could we be C.O.F. rip-offs since Molek composes all keyboards??? (I haven't heard much of C.O.F.'s new material but maybe people are finding some similarities between the two bands other than the keyboards!?-Dale).

C.A. Mag - You've just found a permanent bassist; please tell us who he is and how you found him???. Have you started writing new tunes with him???. When searching for a new member, must that chosen member share the same tastes and philosophies of the band, or do you just search for the most talented musician possible regardless of his convictions???. What are your views on religion and do you call yourselves satanists???.

<u>Valdrihk</u> - His name is Laurnet Seiter and he arrives from France, in March 1996 and was referred to us by one of our contacts. Yes, he is very implicated in our latest compositions. Most importantly he must share our musical convictions, but also a great deal of our interests, beliefs and philosophy. For us, black metal is a state of mind and not a lifestyle, like the wanna-be's who look up at Norvegian black metallers as 24 hours a day incarnated darkness and evil, or so they think of them as. Black metal is purposely a weapon in a war against christianity, not a childish quarrel about who is the fucking truesupreme evil. If that's what black metal is about, then why do we bother recording albums and promoting ourselves instead of retiring ourselves from society and meditate in caverns about which church shall we burn or what deed another act done that makes them posers? We consider ourselves satanists and we are opposed to christian concepts, especially catholocism. They try to be politically correct by preaching in contradiction to the holy book and by this means refill their deserted churches with mindless clones.

C.A. Mag - What is your CD cover painting depicting and what does it mean to you???. The style of the painting is very surrealisticand obscure or vague; was it done this way in order to reflect the feelings or meaning behind it's concept???. Valdrihk - It represents a great deal of the lyrical content. That is the snow dunes of "Calvacade Toward Frozen Crystal Lakes", the mournful demon of "Like Autumn In Spring", the mist and moon of "Sous Le Regard De La Lune", ect....The painting was done in a vague way to fully represent the mist and so anyone can have a personal interpretation of the scene.

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<u>C.A. Mag</u> - What's life like in the Montreal area; do you like it there???. There must be a slew of cool shows there (actually I know there is from my great underground longtime contacts from there!-Dale), due to the large population and large scene there!??. Who's the best live band you have witnessed???.

Valdrihk - It's great living in Montreal, except that there's not a lot of cool hangouts presently (It's gotta be better than Alberta!!ha). I must admit there are some pretty good local bands.

Valdrihk & Dabraxas - (best show) that would have been Enslaved in July 1995.

C.A.Mag - Last words and comments on this interview???. What merchandise is currently available???.

Valdrihk - Vjohrrnt Freyjasson, former vocalist of Moonlore (another good Quebec act!-Dale), which disbanded recently, has joined the band. He acts as an additional vocalist, so I do mostly all the vocals and lyrics, but he is very present, especially during gigs. 

Stratovarius are a power/heavy metal band I enjoy and appreciate, they are quite unknown in North America, however overseas they are a big band, I thought it would be cool to try and secure a interview with them and at my request my finnish brother in metal did just that and I think it turned out rather well...so read on!! Questions by Arto Lehtinen

1. Hi Timo, how are you doing and what have the Stratovarius guys been doing lately ??

T: HI! I'm doing just fine! I've been on a holiday and done some sports (mounting biking and rollerskating) with Jari. Timo mixed one German band called Edguy. Jens has been doing some recording in Sweden and I guess Jörg did the same in Germany.

2. The sixth Strato album titled "Visions" was released last spring. Obviously both the band and the label must have been extremely pleased with the general respond received from the heavy metal public and selling figures as well or am I right??

T: You are right. We were really surprised by the response. We've been on the charts in many countries like Germany, Italy, Spain, Greece, Japan and in Finland (the 16th week on the top 40, close to going gold here!). We did our best with the album and are happy with the result.

3. As for the lyrical side of "Visions" based on Nostradamus' visions and predictions on how the world heads toward the total end. What is your personal point of view on his predictions, do you rely on taking them 100% seriously or have you become prejudiced and skeptic when reading his predictions?!

T: To be honest, I really would not like to believe in them...Don't want to die in two years! But he predicted many things like Hitler, Napoleon and World War II so it's quite frightening in a way.


4. How did you get interested in penning the lyrics about Nostradamus' views for "Visions", as the man's standpoints are definitely one of the most used concepts in lyrics of several heavy metal bands ?!? voice" that won't happen to you ?!?!

T: Yeah, our melodies are quite high and difficult to sing. So far everythings been okay. I've never lost my voice or had to change melodies or sing an octave lower. But you never no...Actually I take a good care of my voice and myself. Meaning I don't drink during touring, I do a lot of warming up, stretching and so-on. Also I do a lot of sports to keep my self fit. Before every tour I also sing a little bit more than normally (which isin't lot...). But I also keep enough brakes in singing. Of course the vocal lessons have helped me a lot.

7. It is obvious the land of the rising sun has fallen on its knees in front of Stratovarius apparently you must have been astonished at having such a glorious support there? Even other Finnish bands f:ex Sentenced have got an extremely good following there, any clue for this syndrome?!

T: We don't know any particular reasons why we are as famous as we are in Japan. When we make songs we don't think "Will it sell or not?". We just make the music that we love. I guess people can recognise that our music comes from the heart. Finland is also

very mystic and interesting country for Japanase (as Japan is for Finnish people). We have things here that are for them very hard to find (snow, clean nature and a lot of space to live).

8. As for both North and South America recognised being a more or less complicated area for selling and doing a promotion, but as for the States I have got the impression. Stratovarius have gained a solid following going through the power metal audience, have you ever planned on doing promotion of any kind for the North American market?

T: Like you said the States is not an easy country for us (of for any other real metal band).

They have their own music scene which differs a lot from European's. But we get a lot of email from the States so I know there are some fans there! But at the moment we haven4t done anykind of a promotion for the States. Episode is released there but I don't know if it has been promoted at all. Of course we would like to do some real promotion there and

maybe do a little tour in the near future!

- 9. Do you agree that countries where heavy and power metal is the popular style are Japan, Germany, Greece? And what have people's reactions been toward your music and gigs there?!?
- T: Nowadays there's also some other countries which are very good for us like: Finland, Spain, Italy, Brazil and Argentina. We did 3 sold out gigs and 2 festival here in Finland in May-June. The crowd was incredible! They sing very loud and show their emotions and that's a lot in Finland! It's the same in Spain, Greece and Japan. In general it's getting better and better. I guess this kind of a melodic metal is coming back!
- 10. I have always paid attention to your cover art of every Stratovarius album, it is quite obvious that the art has always been playing the important role for your, bringing out some kind of the stratovarius spirit... right ?!?
- T: Yes, you got the point. Our music is very symphonic and in a way mystic and "huge". We love covers that are sometimes a little bit hard to explain. And i think when the people see our covers they will get a hint what kind of a music we play. So the cover should allways support the music.
- 11. As for Jörg Michael and Jens Johansson having created the reputation of their own in such classic bands like Dio and Running Wild, of course the most asked one now; How did you meet up those guys after all ? How are you able to rehearse and keep the contact to each other as they happen to dwell else where ?!
- T: Timo (Tolkki) has years (he met him in mixing (F.O.H) some just called to Jens and join the band. So it all. Now when we we have the best guys band. They are so funny guys. So we are them!



Outta the mighty Quebec scene comes A.C., with this professional 7 song demo, filled with brutal semi-technical death metal with a good sound. Absonant draws influences from here and there, but none stick out enough to the point where you go, "that sounds like..." The riffing is heavy and chugging, with some nice drum work and killer deep semi-understandable growlings supplied by Pierre. The song structures are the band's strong point, as they sound very fresh & always keep the listener guessing. SOULSCAR -


"Self-Titled" Demo 1997

Soulscar, despite an obvious sound toward the genre, can't be called a typical death metal band. While the structure and intensity are at the extreme there is something different about the sound that really makes it stand in a different light. The question of importance however is whether this recorded sound is as a result of bad production or it was strived for completely. Putting the production flaws aside (as certain songs indicate much of that buzzing sound was not intended in the music) the band still does hold some unique qualities. The music is extremely easy to get into, that is it holds a certain riffing structure with an upbeat pattern with neither an excess in emotion or technicality; plain and simple. The rest of the music basically situates itself around this guitar driven core; not to downplay the intrigingly industrial style drumming. To the point where even Andrew realized it by mixing them low, the vocals are nothing spectacular and are played as just another melodic instrument (quite harmonized and without rapid fluctuations in intensity). a demo band I don't think one could expect anything more than what Soulscar provides While the production on some of the songs is not very good, the skillful guitar work more than compensates. It escapes the death genre somewhat by not being too muddy sounding, a trend we see with many bands now. Definitely worth checking out and hopefully an album is in the near future. SCEPTER

The phenomenon of revitalizing the whole "old metal" sound is sweeping the globe, but some of us have stayed true to this vision the entire time!. While thrash, death and black metal have each individually left their mark on me both as a listener and as a critic, nothing has touched me as deeply as just plain old, outright, balls to the wall, heavy fuckin' metal!. Some other people that have never "kicked" the metal "habit" are the trio that calls themselves Scepter from Chicago, Illinois in these United States!. Their debut demo "Up Thy Ass" belongs in every metal fan's collection, no matter how lightly you take the genre!. 4 songs of aggressive hell bent, metal anthems and no less you get. It is available from both me and the band for \$5 US. More recently the band released a 4 song mini CD that is equally aggressive in it's aural assault, this too is available from both the band and me (Eternal Darkness Creations) for \$7 US, I will let bassist/ vocalist John take over from here...



Since I really didn't give much of a bio why don't you introduce yourself and your band, by filling in any necessary information of the history and prehistory of Scepter!. "Hello readers. My name is John and I am the bassist/vocalist for Scepter. Scepter also consists of Todd on guitars and Eric on drums. Beginning with Scepter's prehistory, let's go back to 1987. I had joined my first serious band called The Dead Youth. By 1988 Todd had joined Violent Insanity. Our bands often played together so that is how Todd and I became acquainted. Eric also joined Violent Insanity soon after. By 1991 I was getting frustrated with the direction that The Dead Youth was going in, so I asked Todd if he wanted to work on a couple of songs that the rest of The Dead Youth shot down. Eric joined in and within 2 jam sessions Nostradamus was born!. That union only lasted about 6 months due to commitments to our main bands.

In 1993 I got kicked out of The Dead Youth and Violent Insanity dissolved due to lack of members. That left Todd and I to concentrate on Nostradamus full time!. Eric wasn't available then so we knew we'd have to get another drummer. Since this would not be the original Nostradamus line up, Todd and I felt a new name was in order so in the spring of 1994 Scepter was officially born!!. We recruited a drummer named Dave and in the winter of 1994 we recorded the now legendary "Up Thy Ass" 4 assault EP. Shortly after that Dave left the band due to personal matters and Eric joined us once again. We recorded our latest effort "Metal Supremacy" in 1995 and that brings us up to the present. Still awake?.

Was "Up Thy Ass" your first demo?. Did Nostradamus record anything?. Are you satisfied with "Up Thy Ass"?. "Nostradamus mad a four song rehearsal tape but we never released it. "Up Thy Ass" is Scepter's first release. So far we've gone through about 800 tapes by sale, trade and promotion. Just about all of the reviews we've either heard or read about it were positive. We are completely satisfied with "Up Thy Ass" because it sounds as good today as when it was recorded. It has a timeless quality and will never sound dated. We love it and that is the most important thing."

Your production style on "Up Thy Ass" was very Horst Muller/Celtic Frost-ish circa 1984 sounding. I thought it very much like "Emperor's Return", was this sound intentional?. Do you hear this comparison often?. Who produced "Up Thy Ass?. Could you tell us of the processes that went into creating and recreating such a legendary sound?. "Yes we have had many Frost comparisons with our sound. I think that is mainly due to our straight-forwardness of our recording. We've always thought that albums like "Morbid Tales", "Dressed To Kill" and "Too Fast For Love" (Leathur Records version) sounded because of the straight-forwardness. We recorded "Up Thy Ass" at Hair Bear studios and it was produced by Jeff Islinger and Scepter. Jeff's a great engineer because he'll get you the sound you're after and suggests things that are normally taken for granted yet could be easily overlooked.

The sound we were going for was just the natural sound of the band with good sonic separation of the individual instruments. We don't use effects other than a little delay or reverb. We're pretty much a plug-in and go kind of band and I think that "Up Thy Ass" shows that. I've heard a tape of Celtic Frost rehearsing for "Morbid Tales" and it sounds basically the same as the album. A band must already have a sound and know what they want before attempting a studio recording"

Who was behind the helm on "Metal Supremacy"?. Could you tell us a little of what went into writing the tracks on the mini CD and tell us how the recording went?. Any interesting stories to had there?. "Again the same team produced "Metal Supremacy" (with the exception of Dave of course). All of the songs were written at the same time as the songs for "Up Thy Ass" except for "Nostradamus" which was written back in 1991. We chose to put out two releases ourselves rather than put them on a full album in order to develop as a band and build a solid foundation over time. We feel that we are just now starting to tap into our full potential. These days too many bands go for the first deal that comes their way rather than planning for the long haul. We took a little longer recording "Metal Supremacy" because we tried to capture more of an "album" this time around. Who can tell what is album quality these days anyway with all of the black metal recordings being passed off as "album" quality. I think the psychological ramifications of pressing a recording onto a CD instantly registers as an "album" quality product to most listeners simply because it is

on CD! (I think so too -Keith). So whether or not "Metal Supremacy" is a sonic improvement over "Up Thy Ass" is up to the listener. We love it and that is all that matters. As far as interesting stories during the recording session... Jeff, Eric and I were all wasted for the duration so maybe that's why it took a little longer to record! HA!!!"

How has "Metal Supremacy" been received by the public?. How about the press? How can my readers get ahold of a copy and what labels are selling it?. "Some people prefer "Metal Supremacy" to "Up Thy Ass" and vice versa, but for the most part the mini CD has been well received by zines and public alike. Some distributors carrying "Metal Supremacy" are Merciless Records(GER), Near Dark(SWE), Abyss(USA), Repulse(SPA), Displeased(HOL), Bleed(FRA), Eternal Darkness(USA) and many

others. One can always write Scepter as well. "Metal Supremacy" is available for \$7 worldwide and "Up Thy Ass" is still available for \$5 worldwide. Scepter/ P.O. Box 388068/ Chicago, IL. 60639-8068, USA".

I am aware that Scepter has preceded this trend but what do you think of all of the bands reverting back to the traditional ways of metal and hellfire?. Especially in Europe, what do you think of bands like Bewitched, Dissection, Nifelheim and the like who are pretty much the cream of the "new crop"?. "Bands should play whatever they want to play. Perserverance and longevity always separate the real bands from the trendies. Bands who do nothing to innovate usually disappear when they run out of ways to exploit the work of others. I have always been into metal and hellfire so bands reverting back to the old ways probably never knew the old ways to begin with ow true -Keith). When a band decides to "get back to their

(How true -Keith). When a band decides to "get back to their roots" I ask myself why did they leave their roots to begin with. These days all you need is a bootleg Hellhammer shirt, some

spikes and bullet belts, invoke the names of certain old bands and PRESTO!. You're instantly "true". Ten years ago if you saw some sick fuck wearing a Destruction shirt or a bulletbelt you knew he was the real deal. Nowadays it is hard to tell who the enemy is. I can't believe that every "old school" person today is for real or we wouldn't have been subjected the lame thrash and death metal of the early 1990's. Where were all of these "true worriors" of today 10 years ago when we needed them?. My main beef with the "old school" trend is that when record labels use the 1980's tag as a marketing tactic it cheapens the feelings and memories of the past. Scepter is a 1990's band and proud of it!. Trends will come as they will go, but bands like Scepter will stand the test of time because we play metal to please ourselves and not to please others."

I know you do not like to be labeled (the band that is) as thrash, black or death metal, and that just the term "metal" suffices. Do you think that labels are limiting and misleading?. How are some of the interesting ways in which Scepter has been labeled?. "For us, "metal" is all we need. We have been influenced by so many metal styles that to call ourselves just "thrash", "black", "death", "hardrock", or just "heavy metal" would be inaccurate. This is the 1990's we don't want to rehash the past. No one else is writing music we want to hear so we do it ourselves. We have been called a various mixture of all of the styles I just mentioned and that is fine by us. We take all the great music we have been influenced by, add our own ideas and create METAL!. Pure and simple. Bands should label their music with what they feel in their hearts."

What five albums sum up the term "metal" to you?. "Morbid Tales", "Too Fast For Love", "Dressed To Kill", "Black Metal", and "Reign In Blood"."

What is Scepter like live?. What can one expect walking into a Scepter show?. Do you do any covers live?. What would be the ultimate cover for Scepter to do?. "A Scepter concert consists of three fuckers abusing their instruments, banging their heads and driving the audience into a insane metal frenzy!!!. All of the songs off of "Up Thy Ass" and "Metal Supremacy" are fair game for a Scepter performance as well as some new ones like "I'm Going To Hell", "Death Spell", and "Swastika". The only cover we have ever done live was "Oriental Masquerade" as an intro. Right now we are too busy creating our own music to spend time learning someone else's material. Most of the bands/songs we'd like to cover have already been disgraced by other bands. We have some covers in mind maybe one day..."

If you could, please give us a brief rundown on what the songs on "Metal Supremacy" deal with?. "Metal Supremacy" is about being a METALHEAD,, thinking the way you want and not letting society's "betters" tell you how to live your life. Everyday real METALHEADS triumph over the followers of the world by being our own persons. "Death's Head" is about the lame aspects of eternity and how it's not worth worrying about dying because it is unavoidable. "Tetagrammaton" is about Solomon's Seal and his conjurations. Finally "Nostradamus" is about the healer/prophet/astrologer himself."

How long have you been playing bass?. Do you play any other instruments?. What is Scepter's practice regiment?. "I have been playing bass since 1985. As a kid I played piano, saxophone and trumpet. I have never stuck with them because I needed a ROCK instrument. I wasn't into the drums and guitar was too delicate for me. I was into Steve Harris and Nikki Six so I came to the conclusion that bass was for me, it's twelve years later and I am still playing bass so I guess I made the right decision. As for practicing we usually just work on what we need to for the time (i.e. during the "Metal Supremacy" day we work on "Metal Supremacy" songs). We never force anything out. If practice becomes a chore it's not worth it!."

you describe Scepter's vocal style because whilst you don't grunt you definitely don't shriek. How do you describe it?. "It took awhile to break my voice in but it takes time to perfect like any other instrument. My main priority as a vocalist is to sound as sick as possible yet understandable. I always liked the qualities Tom Worrior, Cronos, Alice Cooper, and Tom Angelripper had in their voices. Maybe that crossection is a good description of my voice. Being a bassist first, vocals have always been a secondary concern for me."

What bands have you played out with? Are people that see you live surprised by your straightout approach?. What have given you their "seal of approval"? "We have played with Funeral Nation, Mortar, Cianide, Corpsevomit, Ember and Eternal Hatred. Chicago has some pretty diverse bands so others probably just look at us as one more piece of the mosaic. Most bands here, wisely, are only concerned with themselves and their own sound. I suppose we have the seal of approval form the aformentioned bands. Other bands outside of Chicago we share a mutual support with are Vulpecula, Abigail, Pentacle, Deceased, Occult and Typhon".

Any comments in closing?. "Believe in your METAL."

I hope you have enjoyed these few words with a real metal meister! (I know I did Keith, my metal brother!! Thank you!!!-Dale). Remember the name-Scepter and buy their stuff!!!. ALL metal fans must own a copy of "Metal Supremacy" or else F.O.A.D.!!!!!!!!!!.

Ha here's a few messages from the friendly Canadian government to your humble editor!. 

ETERNAL DARKNESS

Tell us about the year and age you first got into the underground!??.

Okay, I first got into metal around 1982, when I was about 10 years old with bands like Iron Maiden and bands of that nature that were really big at the time. Then every year I was into it (metal) I wanted more and more extreme stuff. I first heard Venom in '84, and I first

got Venom in '85 with "Welcome To Hell" and that sent me on my journey to the underground.

What were the first demo/zines/bands you originally got into???.

The first 'zine I ever saw or read was called Unholy Book and I think it was from Texas, I'm not sure but I bought it in a local record store here and loved it. That inspired me all the way up to until today, it still inspires me. Metal Forces, was always big back when that was more of a 'zine then a magazine, it was always big on my list. Morbid...Morbid magazine from Norway and Sweden, when he (the editor) moved to Sweden. Umm...early demos, Dreamdeath - "More Graveyard Delving" (demo '86), was a real big one that inspired me to get more into the underground with tape trading, a lot of Pittsburg bands like Dreamdeath, Bird Of Prey, early Necropolis...uh...

What was the first band you wrote!??.

That would be Pedophile in Arizona...it's kind of a funny story, cause I wrote away for Morbid mag from Norway. I was living in Mesa, Arizona and (when) I got Morbid mag, I read about Pedophile, who lived 2 streets over and I wrote them through a Norwegian magazine (There in lies one of the true beauties of the underground scene! -Dale). That was the first band, I ever wrote.

When did you first begin tape trading???.

I started tape trading with my friends in 1986. When I got my first dual deck stereo in 1986. I moved to Arizona (From Pennsylvania), I met lots of people who were into tape trading and the scene down there. So, I really expanded when I moved down there in 1987. I started building a list.

Okay...without getting too deep into your record label or your mag yet. Do you feel your tape trading suffers, due to restraints on your time, produced by your other activities!??.

Oh yeah!. Good question, I really do. I'm afraid, (anymore) I only have a couple of tape traders and your one of them (Yes, I am I count myself lucky Keith's list fucking rocks! -Dale). You know for yourself how long it takes me to get tapes back to people. But I always apologize to 'em and always try to send neat stuff when I can. But yeah it does suffer.

When and how did you get the idea for Eternal Darkness mag!??.

Okay, I was reading a 'zine from...I was really into 'zines in the like the mid to late '80's, I was reading a 'zine from New Jersey called Hammerhead and said to myself "hey I could do this", and sure enough a couple of months later I had one starting to develop and about a year later in 1989, I put out my first issue. But, Hammerhead 'zine is why Eternal Darkness exists today!.

Cool...some of your favorite all time fanzines, past and present???.

Old ones would definitely be Unholy Book, Morbid, the old Wild Rag! Before it turned into a newsletter I really loved the old Wild Rag!. And uh new ones I really like are Heresy from Australia, I like Visionary's Dream form New Jersey a lot, The Sepulchral Voice R.I.P. Uh the 'zines that look underground but are well written, is what means a lot to me. The writing and the underground look to it. **Preach on brother Dempe!!...we share that same philosophy!.**

Yeah Canadian Assault to of course!.

Ah ah ah...How did your first issue turn out and how many copies were printed???.

The first issue was rough, it was the stapled in the corners(type thing), it was done on a really old type writer(gasp...type writer, what's that!? Ha ha -Dale), my first 3 issues were done on this horrible old type writer. They were put together neatly at least, I put a lot of time into them, it(issue one) sold like only a hundred copies.

Is that how many you printed???.

That is how many I printed. It is sold out, I only printed a hundred copies.

What bands were in your first issue???.

There was 6 bands interviewed, there was Nocturnus, Human Remains from Phoenix, Black Ritual from Pennsylvania, Arcane from Texas, Hellwitch from Florida and one other I can't remember right now.

Can you explain the long history of Eternal Darkness mag and the old school kings Order From Chaos!??.

Oh sure, I wrote to Chuck(Keller) to get a "Crushed Infamy" demo in 1989. He sent one to get reviewed in issue two of Eternal Darkness, I reviewed it and sent the issue to him. He called me up and said it was the first magazine to compare Order From Chaos to the bands they actually wanted to be compared to. Like (bands such as) Bathory, Terrorizer, Carcass, stuff like that which we were

really big fans of at the time and still are. Our relationship just blossomed from there, we started tape trading. Then that summer Chuck, the summer of 1990 he said that he had to come down and visit his Aunt in Tuscon(Arizona), I was living in Phoenix at the time. So I said why don't you stay with me for the week that he was down and he did. It became a yearly thing, he would come down and visit me and I became really good with them(the band) and eventually released a seven inch of theirs. And umm...I was friends with all of them until they broke up, but I'm still really good friends with Chuck and Mike today.

How about a few words on your series of compilation tapes!??.

I started the simple that, it's not people sounded like That's sound like Yeah unfortunately tapes, there professionall Oh that was Yes the long ended). This the issue and That's a Heh heh go Did you find them!??. Oh veah. included), more

they are all for sale, they all cost 3 US/4 elsewhere(postage except for the last one, from '96 it is five dollars, cause it's done professionally...

list them for anyone that wants to order!??.

Sure, the first one is called "In The Darkness' Cold Clutches" from 1991(90 minutes), 2nd is "Darkness Reborn" from 1992(90 minutes), 3rd "A Dark Time" from 1993(80 minutes), then "Let's Fight In The Dark" from 1996(90 minutes).

When did you come up with the idea and concept of forming your record label???.

It kind of started with the compilation tapes, I had hoped it would always blossom into more. But I never had the money but uh...I originally went into it with a friend to do a seven inch in 1994. It was to be(either) Order From Chaos or Nepenthe, but Nepenthe weren't ready to release anything at the time. So I got O.F.C. to give me some live tracks they recorded in the studio and that became the "Live: Into Distant Fears" 7". My friend kinda bailed on me, so it just became Eternal Darkness Records, just from doing that seven inch. So far, I've released 3 seven inches and a couple cassettes...

Kay hold on, your going right into my next question...perfect. Could you list all of the products you have put out and describe each one!??.

Sure, 1994 I have the Order From Chaos live 7", it had 2 songs for 16 minutes. Live O.F.C., that was almost unheard of and it is available(as bonus tracks) on the "Plateau Of Invincibility" CD. But, it's better on vinyl cause vinyl rules! (He only speaks the truth! - Dale). It's available on red and black vinyl and Order From Chaos play the best black/death war metal(ever) in the scene!. The next release wasn't until early 1996, I released the Vulpecula(band made up Chuck Keller formerly of O.F.C. and Chris from Nepenthe - Dale) demo '95, but it wasn't really an extended release. That was put out to just tide(us) over until the, until I put out the Vulpecula 7" ep out, but the demo is still available for anyone who just wants a cassette of it. But, the seven inch "Phoenix Of Creation" which is the same as the demo and is available on blue or black vinyl, they noclucent black metal in the vein of ancient Samael or Mortem from Norway, very cult sound, very underground sound. It's the first recording the band ever did in the studio together. Then spring of ''96 I released...(pause)...I re-released the Nepenthe - "Ligea" 7". Which was supposed to be released on a European label, which I will not mention here, that kinda bailed on them. So I released it, it is 4 US/5 dollars every place else. They really, really brutal death metal in the vein of like Treblinka(who later became Tiamat -Dale) or Nihilist(who changed there name and formed Entombed -Dale) a very Swedish sound.

Okay, your working on a split 7" ep release right!??. Yes!


Tell us about that and what bands are invovled???.

Well, my next release which isn't out yet, it will be out in early February(1998, this interview was conducted on Jan.13th/98 -Dale). It is a band called Ares Kingdom which is Chuck and Mike formerly of O.F.C., their first project since Order From Chaos together(the release will be in the form of a cassette ep -Dale). Then the split 7" is gonna be Ares Kingdom and R.U. Dead?, which is a band from Germany that is Fleshcrawl(the Black Mark records band) members and ex-members of a band called Poison. It will be a Eternal Darkness and Majestic Union Records from Germany(co releasing

The Eternal Darkness Back Issues... When pressing a 7", how many do you usually press!??.

Usually 500 at a time I usually see how it sells then do a pressing in another color five, six or seven hundred that is usually as far as it goes.

Can you give a rough release date and price on the new issue # 11!??.

The new issue will be out by the end of January for certain, cause I'm done typing it. I'm just laying it out now. It costs \$6 dollars US and comes with a sampler tape with Cromlech, Tyrant from Australia, Armageddon, Holocaust and a lot of good bands. The issue is gargantuan, well over 80 pages(fuck he is not joking either, that number could well inflate past the 100 page mark when all is said and done! -Dale).

Please give us a list of all the bands featured!??.

Okay let me get the list...(pause)...This issue has lots of different kinda bands, like lots of power metal, lots of black metal and death metal. Let's see, we have interviews with: Samael, Cradle Of Filth, Angra, Steel Prophet, Summon from the United States, Pentacle, Scepter(see this interview elsewhere for a preview of the killer work Keith does! -Dale), Witch-Hunt, Misery, Dew Scented, Ablaze My Sorrow, Disciple, Mournful Congregation, Martire, Star Gazer, War Hammer, Conqueror. It's a big issue, I hope everyone enjoys it, I have big hopes for this issue!.

On what basis do you choose bands for a releases, on your E.D. records???.

Well, if I have the money that's the first thing!. I like to think ahead and not to overestimate my budget. But usually I have to know the band or be friends with them and know them as people as well. Of course love their music!, I have to be totally dedicated to their music to want to put out a 7" or a ep of their music.

So you would never release anything you weren't heavily into but you know will sell!??.

No! Never! On thing you can say about Eternal Darkness bands is that they don't sell very well. That's one thing I can say about myself, I don't sign bands on the basis of whether they sell, so I have to like 'em.

That is the way it should be!!.

Yeah! I just sign stuff that I would like to have in my collection.

Are there any bands at the moment, you have your eye on you would like to eventually release something from!??.

Well, Christian of Inverted from Sweden, and I have talked about releasing a 7" but I think that is probably way in the offing now.

That's about it, there's a couple of bands I would have loved to have done something with like Forest Of Proud Slavs from Poland, or Darkened from the US I liked a lot.

Has there been many setbacks financially for the mag & label???.

Yeah no money! Ha ha it's always been a big problem. I don't have like a really good job, I um always seem to be kinda in between jobs or in a job that doesn't pay too well. As I'm still in college, I'm a bio/chem major and I'm trying to bachelors in that so I can work in criminalistics.

Very cool!.

Yeah nothing fancy, but I always get it out(mag/label releases), I sell enough to keep it afloat. So it's a lot of integrity, a lot of heart.

Have you ever had any printers/pressers give you grief with printing explicit materials!??.

When I have gotten the mag done professionally over the years. I've always had problems with printers objecting to the material or going against what I say or what I want so I just choose to do it myself. I've had stuff like printers loosing originals and just outrageous stuff like that, I just can't stand!

How does your distribution go?, a lot of trading with with other distros and labels???.

I just trade with a lot of labels and distributions yeah, the first couple months when it(a release) first comes out I do a lot of trading. My mail bill(during this period) is really expensive. Yeah I trade with a lot of labels like Moribund and Merciless and a lot of good labels like that. I sell a lot through my catalogue, that's how I sell most if it after the(initial) big push for it.

Is your label specific to one genre or is it open to anything under the mighty banner of metal!??.

It's open to anything under the banner of metal, so far it's just been black/death pretty much. I love all forms of metal from doom to heavy metal to black and death metal. All over the place I love all forms of metal.

Now onto my fave question in this mag. What is your opinion on the powerful Venom and their glorious "Black Metal" LP!??. Venom's "Black Metal" ahhh yes!! I love the album, it is truly a classic. It's not my favorite Venom album, but it's definitely one of my favorite albums of all time. My favorite Venom album is "Welcome To Hell", "Black Metal" is second and is probably in my top 10 of all time. Truly great and a landmark release for the band. With the bands I've encountered in live situations or on the phone have just been... (pause)...some have just been total assholes. I see a lot of fans like this too. But aside from that I think the scene has the potential to be just as good as it used to be. I like what's coming out today(on the whole).

Have you ever had any hate mail, from the things you have said in your mag!??.

Someone just asked me this the other day, it was my girlfriend, she asked if I had ever received any nasty letters. I don't think I have. I've received a couple nasty letters from churches that have gotten my address. Yeah they sent me literature and said quit the mag and change your ways or you'll be cursed for the rest of your life blah, blah, I'm not kidding either. I wrote the address on their pamphlets and told them off.

What do you know about Canada as a country!??.

I know it's a country with some great bands heh heh...



You would be dead wrong!. Jim Matheos has created a swirling, emotional kaleidescope of progressive heavy metal classiness. The piano/keyboard performance of Kevin Moore (yes the ex-Dream Theater member) is superb. Not to be outdone is vocalist Ray Alder who puts in a catchy, smooth, world beating performance. The track compositions and arrangements of Matheos bring tears to my eyes. Confident, flowing, and endlessly interesting are a few words to describe the monolithic musical construction that has gone on here. Never letting technicality suffocate the emotion and heavy catchiness of the track. Sounds good!?, It is. Get it!!.



TESTAMENT "Demonic" 1997 CD

(Burnt Offering/Mayhem Records) Yeah! Testament returns once again from the ashes, with a new recording line-up that includes Gene Hoglan (of Dark Angel/Death and Strapping Young Lad fame). Upon initial listen I wasn't sure about a few things, such as Chuck Billy's almost constant gruff vocal delivery, which has grown on me immensely. As he brutalizes his way thru in a deep and thick, death metal like assault, he does so to killer effect!. The lyrics are really great; and, deal with topics like tales of demons "Demonic Refusal", witch burning "The Burning Times", medieval battle chronicle in "Hatred's Rise", and in "John Doe" a twisted true story of the havoc wrecked on the life of a deceased drug abuser. The guitars, with a bit of the '90's sound, are firmly rooted in heavy as fuck territories. Guitarist, Eric Peterson, has written some of the most immense and memorable riffs ever!, This album is chock full of them. Cheers Eric mate!. The sung, sort of outro, sort of song "Nastrovia" ends things on a moody trip, that brings to an end a masterpiece!!. I was going to say this matched up against my all time fave Testament album "Legacy", but I stand corrected these boys have outdone themselves and should be proud. Support this band and buy this. It was made by brothers in metal who's vision has stayed true. How often do I get to say that?!. Album of 1997!!!!!!!!!.

JUNGLE ROT -"Slaughter The Weak" 1997 CD (Pulverizer Records)

If you happened, by chance, to be a reader of the Canadian publication, The Sepulchral Voice, you will recall me reviewing J.R.'s first and second demos 1994's "Rip Your Face Off", was a little rough, but showed promise and I suggested the band should put a little more emphasis on the power sections on their then thrashy attack. Then came '95's "Skin The Living" demonstration, they did just that too, strengthening and bring to prominence more fully their heavy riffing. Now, we have their debut long player out on Pulverizer Records, nine trax of pounding, straight on death metal!. My fave song has to be "Butchering Death" with it's absorbing structure, catchinese both musically and lyrically, which ends in an array of nifty double bass from drummer, Rob. Great packaging and presentation. The only drawback I can see is the length. Weighing in at 30 minutes (an intense 30 at that); but, shit the CD only costs \$10 US(postage included)!.

SADIST "Crust" 1997 CD (Displeased Records)

I must admit, I was at first glance appalled at the "Crust" cover, being a fan of Sadist's 1st album. The cover looks like a Fear Factory album cover. And, I thought, "Oh no, they've gone fucking industrial/death or some shit!". But, after all, you cannot judge a book by it's cover, right!? So, I gave the disc a spin and here is what I found. Some heavy riffing here and there that makes me go "hell yeah!". However, those portions are choked and suffocated with heavy industrial influence, keyboard parts, symphonic charged hiccups!. To address their slogan on the album, I took the liberty of rewriting it: Extreme? NOT! Aggressive? YES(When not watered down by flimsy and boring keyboreds!) Talented? DEFINITELY(But put to use sparingly here!) Sick? LYRICALLY AFFIRMATIVE! MUSICALLY NOT EVEN CLOSE!. So unless you whack off to second rate industrial/death/keyboard music, stay away from this LP!!!. ELEND "Weeping Nights" 1997 CD (Holy Records/PHD Canada)

Elend is made up of members from both France and Austria. "Weeping Nights" is the bands 3rd CD, and is really only 3 new songs and 6 songs re-done from their second album, only with only female vocals, the male screams/vocals have been removed. This album is a highly ambitious and complex work of classical music mixed with atmospherics of a somber variety. For instance, a track like "Ethereal Journey's" is like a soundtrack from a suspense movie. With it's low expanding violin sections, flute interludes, angelic utterances and booming percussive pounds buried low in the mix for resonating effect you will feel deep within. I would only recommend "Weeping Nights" to those who are fans of classical music or maybe ambient/symphonic genres. 
PENTACLE "The Fifth Moon" 1997 MCD (Displeased Records)

I had the opportunity to interview Nyk of Possession and jumped at it, you only need to read my review elsewhere of the bands last product "Scourge And Fire" to see how much I love their music and the as of yet unfullfilled success they so richly deserve in one writer's opinion. I've always been pleased with the quality of our songs. I think that is proved, especially by "Scourge And Fire", which has a rerecorded version of one of the first songs Possession ever wrote yet it sounds as fresh and powerful now as it did then. Obviously, we have not had a lot of money to work with which has lead to just o.k. production but not the best that we would have hoped for. I suppose, part of the reason for that was our own inexperience in the studio as well as working with people who were not familiar with death metal. But as far as each song goes, we are very proud of them and are excited for the people to hear our new material. "Eternally Haunt" has sold around 2, 000 copies so far but we have plenty left so I think everyone should order it! (Yes do yourself a favor at these dirt cheap prices for such great music! -Dale). You will get "Eternally Haunt", and "Scourge And Fire" for only \$11 us ppd. You're not going to get a better deal anywhere!.


I am sure many reading this have seen your full page ads in Metal Maniacs, considering the size of it's readership, how tremendous has the response been from it? What did it cost, for said full pager!??.

The response was not as great as we had hoped but we look at it as a building block, a stepping stone to the next level of name recognition. Actually, the biggest failure of the whole project was our inability to release another full length CD in a timely fashion. But we are still moving forward-slowly but surely. I believe each ad was about \$700/issue but there were many factors involved in that price.

Tell me about the scene in your area? Some cool bands from there to check out? Kansas seems to me, as an outside observer to be a little sparse as a metal scene, is this so and has it affected or held back Possession in any way???.

Well, you hit the proverbial nail on the head!. Kansas City is extremely sparse. We used to think that it didn't matter but in hindsight I know that it has adversely affected us in three ways, 1. Not being able to replace members easily at all 2.Not being able to meet and get to know people in the underground on a regular basis 3.Not having the opportunity to play shows with bigger bands in the underground. Word of mouth is still the best promotion in the underground and we are missing that being in Kansas City. There is one great band from K.C. (Come on there is more then one, how about Ares Kingdom, Vulpecula, Nepenthe!? -Dale), that is Angelcorpse which has risen on the wings of the bassist/singer's former Order From Chaos. They've played a European tour already and are preparing for another tour with Immortal last I heard (Wonder if that happened I heard Demonaz quit Immortal!, cause of cancer in his arms). But they never play in Kansas City.

Now onto one of my fave questions, what do you think of the almighty album "Black Metal" by Venom!??.



You are going to think this is blasphemous but I have never heard Venom's "Black Metal" album (Oh my, blasphemous is a gentle word to use, all self-respecting metalheads need that album!! However that is only my opinion, even if it is correct he he -Dale), until I saw them live at the (Milwaukee) Metalfest last year I had never heard of them at all. Sorry (You mentioned Cirith Ungol coming up so you are surely forgiven! -Dale).

Please tell us about the whole deal with Casey and Metal Merchant Records!??.

The whole deal is far too lengthy to into here (I was hoping you would go deep into this and space of no concern, use all you want bro! -Dale) but if you check out our website every gory detail is there for you to savour (Well, actually I know pretty much everything, I have heard your side and heard Casey's over the phone, but my readers may not know it, oh well do check out the website to see more on it -Dale). In a nutshell, Casey is a rip off and we emerged victorious in the end.

It is obvious from your music you guys are fans of '80's power metal and deathrash, care to list some old favorites and maybe an obscure band or two, my readers should search out!??.

Yes! That is our genesis, '80's metal like the old mainstays, Slayer, Sabbat, Metallica, Anthrax. But I also got into Worrior, Warlock, Toxik,

Q5, Apocrypha, Armored Saint, and of course old Testament, King Diamond, Mercyful Fate and old Fates Warning, Oh, and how about Cirith Ungol (ah yes, the "Frost And Fire" & "King Of The Dead" LP's!! -Dale)!?!.

What do you know about my country, Canada!? What is your opinion on the Canadian scene? Any bands or mags from here you dig? Do you find there is a 'Canadian sound' so to speak???.

I grew up in North Dakota so I took more family vacations in Canada than I did in the States. Mostly to Winnipeg (Manitoba) but I have been all the way to B.C. (Cool I am directly in the middle of those two provinces -Dale). I don't know much about the "Canadian scene", the only bands that I remember from being from Canada are Obliveon and Annihilator (Ugh! I thought being such an '80's metal fan you would have heard of Infernal Majesty, Razor, Exciter, Slaughter, Voivod, Sacrifice ect... guess we always get over looked though he he so what's new -Dale). And the only sound that comes to mind when I think of Canada is "eh" (That was a shot, eh!? Ha -Dale). Sorry.

What were the recording and pressing costs of your brilliant 3" mini CD "Scourge And Fire"?. How did those recording sessions go, possibly you could describe your schedule on a day you recorded!?. Is the new material in the same vein as that release???.

The recording ran about \$800 but the entire project ended up at about \$3000 for 1000 CD's. We had the original artwork done and then had to have custom dyes cut to print the cover because of the size (For those who have not scene it, the cover is cool it is like a one piece modified and enlarged match book cover almost, very cool! -Dale). The sessions went rather well and it turned out better then any of our other recordings to date although we were extremely unhappy with the snare sound on it. A typical day of work recording was to get up about 3 pm, begin recording around 7 pm, work until about 5 am and then go home and go to bed. Rather exciting, huh?. Well, "Scourge And Fire" is the new song on that CD but as I hope you've noticed each of our songs has a style of it's own. Some of our new songs are faster than anything we have played before and yet a couple new ones are slower than anything we

have done before. The vocals are still varied and I will try to layer them a little more next time. Also, the lyrics will cover a broader range of subjects than our first couple CD's did. But when you put it on your CD player you will know right away that this is still Possession!. We are planning to do a demo for some labels soon and we will release a full length sometime this year (1998) with or without label support.

Are you planning on staying independent (possibly with Euro licensing?), or as I often wonder when a active band such as Possessed was in '95/early '96 becomes sort of quiet, that you are fielding offers from labels and if so which labels have shown interest!??.

We are just now starting to contact some labels in order to get them a demo of new songs and we would like to hook up with someone for the next CD but we are not going to wait forever, when the time comes to record the next CD we will do it regardless of label support. Licensing will be imperitive in order to properly promote the next CD.

What do you do in your spare time for enjoyment? What are some of your favorite movies, novels and mags???.

I love playing soccer and my movie favs are Exorcist III, The Prophecy, The Hitcher, The Ninth Configuration, and anything from Monty Python, oh, and the Red Green show from Canada is great! (Ha cool, "if women don't find you handsome, they should at least find you handy!" -Dale). I enjoy reading books on demonology and the occult and even the Bible. As far as mags go I read The Christian Research Journal, Metal Maniacs, PIT, and The Grimoire Of Exalted Deeds.



Seen any good live shows/bands as of late? Fave show of all time? What bands have you not seen live that you would die to see???.

Lately, I've seen Cannible Corpse, Testament, were Mercyful Fate in '93 and Samael in '95. Diamond 2.Manowar (Oh shit man, those are

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
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
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Here is an interview I conducted with Kenny Hallman, of the legendary black/thrash metal masters. They have been a fave band of mine since their debut came out in 1987!. Their album that has touched me and many other metal heads to the core. Well, Infernal is back and have original singer Chris Bailey in the fold!!!. They have been fielding offers from labels such as: Metal Blade, Mascot Records, Nuclear Blast, Century Media, Displeased Records and of course Canada's own Hypnotic Records. As I type this interview (Jan. 9th, 1998) the band has just entered Signal To Noise Studios in Toronto to finish recording the album, after which it will me mixed in Montreal with the engineer who did Obliveon's (Can) last album!. Read on, I command....



- 1. Let's start off with the '86 debut demo tape, where was it recorded? How many copies were made???. The first demo was made after being together for 6 months. It was recorded at "The Metal Works"; in Toronto. We self financed it and released 2,000 copies of which we sent out 200-300 out to fanzines, magazines, and record companies. After we sold out, we pressed 1,000 more (shit 3,000 copies of the demo! -Dale) and shortly after, signed with Roadrunner Records.
- 2. During the '85/86 time line, were you in contact with many bands from within the country (i.e. Aggression, Slaughter, Razor, Sacrifice, Exciter ect...)?. Who was involved with 'The Council Of Canadian Metal Kings'??. I have heard this was a figment of ex-drummer Rick Nemes imagination, is that true!??.

We knew Sacrifice and Slaughter. But, knew Razor the best because Sheepdog (Stacey) was a real close friend of Steve and I before he joined Razor. All 3 of us grew up in Kingston, Ontario, Canada and had jammed many times in the past. The whole "Council Of Kings" thing was Rick's doing. Instead of just listing our names as members, he used "Council Of Kings" as if sort of tied into the name Infernal Majesty.

- 3. How did you get signed to Roadrunner intially?. I have a show you guys played in Detroit, Michigan 10/14/88 on video.

 At this show you played the bonus trax from the Displeased "None..." re-release. Chris said at this show, that these were new trax due out on your 2nd LP on Roadrunner. From this point on, what happened to sour things with Roadrunner!??. Roadrunner had received a copy of our demo tape and had contacted us. We had several other offers at the time and really didn't know who to sign with. We hired the lawyer that was handling Triumph; and we had him handle all the negotiations for us and we all decided Roadrunner was the best label to handle us. The relationship with Roadrunner could have been a lot better. They never really supported us in any major way. We had to book and finance all our own tours and a total lack of communication from them so we decided that we would go it alone.
- 4. I also have on video, an appearance by Infernal Majesty on Muchmusic's Power Hour from '88. You were being interviewed by Erica Ehm, afterward they played the video for "None Shall Defy"; and it was the guys first time to see time to see the finished product, what did you think of it (I love that video it rules!)!??.

I have hosted Power Hour a couple of times and it helps to promoted us in Canada. The video for "None Shall Defy" was paid for by us and not Roadrunner. So when we did the video, we went to Muchmusic and asked them if they would play it and they agreed. A couple of days before they were to air it they asked if Rick and I if we would like to go on air. And, of course, we said sure. When we got to the studio we were surprised to find out that we were going to be hosting the show, which was fun. Shortly after they asked us to come back with the "Name the mascot" contest and we agreed, but I don't remember the name that won, but we just called him "Bob" (The name that won was "Deadlus" -Dale).

5. What was your reaction, when you found out that Displeased Records from Holland, had bought the rights to the debut from Roadrunner and was re-releasing it for the first time ever on CD!?. At what point, did you find out cause I heard Displeased was trying to find you to tell you guys about it!??.

We were really surprised when we found out. The timing couldn't have been better because at the time we were looking for a new deal. We thought that "None Shall Defy" had had it's day. We were even more surprised to find out that Displeased had included 2 songs that were never released to the public. I had heard about it in January of 1996, Ron had given me a call and told me that his label was re-releasing the album because he thought the album deserved to be available on CD (How right he is too! -Dale).

6. What was happening with the band, at the time of the 1991 demo "Creation Of Chaos"?. How come you guys seemed to just disappear after that!?. I have heard rumors that the vocalist, Vince from that demo was arrested for attacking his girlfriend kind of Vampiric assault, any truth to that!??.

After Chris Bailey left, we auditioned a whole bunch of guys and out of that we hired Vince. At that time he seemed like the right guy for the band but it never worked out that way. Sure we played a lot of shows and recorded "Creation Of Chaos" together but things just never felt right. Then Vince got into trouble with a girl he had met and ended up going to jail. So we were without a singer until we got Chris Bailey back last year and we couldn't be more happier.

7. Did you have any clue, the profound effect I.M. has had on the underground scene of the late 80's/early '90's? I have

heard many death metal bands (i.e.- Seance ect...) claim you as an influence, do you listen to any death metal stuff from the '90's on!??.

Well we had some idea because we would read about it but not to the extent that it's at now. Dawn (Swe) have recorded "Night Of The Living Dead", and Christ Denied (U.K. I believe?-Dale) have recorded "Overlord". It's kind of weird hearing your songs being played by other bands but we were glad that bands say that we influence them. We think it is a great honor. I try to stay on top of what's going on, but it's really hard to keep up with all the latest releases. I still stick to the early stuff like Slayer, Mercyful Fate, Kreator and Exodus.

8. To take another trip to the rumor mill, I have heard the forthcoming 2nd LP was recorded some time ago with Scott

Burns in Toronto and is now just having the finishing touches put on it!?. How was working with Scott Burns!??.

completed. Again, we paid for that ourselves and that's when the trouble with Vince began. Working with Scott was a great experience as we have always liked his work but now that


we have Chris back we will release the album early this year.





9. What does the new album sound like? Is it in the "None Shall Defy" style or the less interesting '91 demo style, or neither?. Will the second album also be released on Displeased Records!??.

The new album sounds like Infernal Majesty, what I mean is that once you hear it you will know who it is. We played most of the new songs on our European tour which we just completed and the response was great. We recorded 2 of them as samplers and released them on the "Kanada Conpilation" (info on our web page) they are not the same versions that will appear on the new album. We have just signed with Hypnotic Records (killer Canadian label, with: Voivod, Mundane, Anvil, Mundane, Razor ect... -Dale) and the album ill be out in mid-March 1998.

10 Who is handling the lyric writing now?. I mean Psychopath (the old bassist) did the lion's share of lyrics and was responsible for gems like "Marching defiant, the legions bear witness, to stand against evil, means you stand alone!". Is the lyrical content on the new one similar in vein to the old stuff!??.

Steve Terror is writing most of the lyrics and has been for some time. The lyrical content is a bit different, we have branched out a bit more, songs like "The Art Of War", "Where Is Your God", "Death Roll" and "White Knight" should say it all, it's not just satan... satan... But musically it's in the same vein as our earlier stuff.

11. What were some of your musical influences when you formed Infernal Majesty?. Have those changed drastically?. Would I be way off in saying I hear a slight old Alice Cooper influence in the instrumental "R.I.P." off the first full-length!??.

Steve and I have been playing together for so long that we even have the same taste and influences in music. Judas Priest, Mercyful Fate, and early Slayer. To this day we still listen to it because it was great music. "R.I.P." was a thing I was screwing around with just before we went into the studio to do "None Shall Defy" the others said "hey why don't we use that as an intro to Night Of The Living Dead" I thought, why not, but as far as Alice Cooper influence, I don't know.

12. You were scheduled a short time back to do a European tour, did it happen!?. How were the reactions and crowd sizes over there?. Will you ever be touring out in the western Canadian provinces!??.

We just completed a 32 city/11 country tour in Europe with Malevolent Creation, Vader and Vital Remains (Damn that bill kicks ass! Dale). The tour went extremely well and all the bands got along great. All but 3 shows sold-out and we were really happy with the fan support that Infernal Majesty received, totally amazing to see people remember us after all of this time. The tour promoter wanted us to stay another 6 weeks and hook up with Unleashed but we decided to turn it down because we were getting a lot of interest from record companies and we wanted to sign something now and get the new album finished. Right now our label wants to have the new album out in March, then straight back to Europe and promote it after that, who knows. We would love to tour Canada (Hey Cryptopsy did it twice and Disciples Of Power have done it 3 times, so it must not be that horrible ha ha -Dale) if it was feasible but we would have to hook up with a big band to do it.

13. Last comments to the readers of Canadian Assault!?. Future plans and merchandise available!?. Thanks for the interview Kenny, you rule brother!!!.

Thanks for all of the support that has been given to Infernal Majesty over the years. We are proud to be a Canadian band and always will be. Our new album "Unholier Than Thou" will be released in March 1998, and you can also get the re-release of "None Shall Defy" in Canada as our new label has also agreed to market it in Canada, if you need any further info check out our current web site at : www.cgocable.net/~fish.

GAMMA RAY "Somewhere Out In Space" '97 CD (Noise Records)

After reading a cool interview with guitarist/vocalist/composer Kai Hansen in Sentinel Steel mag, I was excited about hearing this album!. I have been a fan of Hansen's work in Halloween for a long time. However, my only experience with Gamma Ray is from the double live album "Power Of Metal" that featured alongside G.R., Rage, Conception and Helicon. This album seems to be superior to most of the live material on that album, which had tracks lifted from their entire catalogue! "Somewhere Out In Space" is a triumph, very heavy and very uplifting. Straight from the explosive opening track, "Beyond The Black Hole"; to the dazzling, "Shine On" with it's catchy chorus and delicate driving guitar stylings. The album is a epic, swirling space story, that at times reminds me of the basic concept of the excellent movie "Stargate". Hansen's compositions are very mature and

heaviness has not been spared. At times the feel and majestic flow and epic grandeur reminds me of Kai's past Halloween days. Very recommended for fans of intelligent an catchy power/heavy metal.

DOMINUS "Vol. Beat" 1997 CD (PHD Canada/Die Hard)

This band is totally unknown to me. One thing I enjoy straight off the bat is the heavy riffing and rapid speed of the tunes. However, most everything else on here does not do it for me. Shouted hardcore vocals with a slight rap tone both in sound and execution. The death metal influence in the riffing is quite evident and appreciated. But the aforementioned vocal patterns and goofy samples like record scratching and red necks talking, ruins things. Another saving grace of "Vol. Beat" is some smoking guitar solos, the highs are high and lows are low. It is a mixed bag, so all I have to say is caveat emptor.



MALEVOLENT CREATION "In Cold Blood" 1997 CD (Pavement Records)

Too many death metal albums lack the intensity that at one point helped to define the genre. What a pleasant surprise that "In Cold Blood" opens up with a blast beat! Throughout this Album, including the cover art of some guy with nails and hooks stuck in him, reaffirms a position for brutal extreme death metal for some time to come. Derik Roddy is one of those people who has a gift for the genre, having been born with more than two arms. Intricate and extreme, the drumming goes from moderately fast to insanely fast, all with the rigorous and solid execution that even a man named Xy* couldn't do with a drum machine. It just never lets up, and in retrospect that blast beat that opens the album is hardly a blast beat at all!. The dual guitars provide that extreme driving metal feeling -- one usually providing continuous rhythm, which in the end just adds to the insanity, and the other on very modern power metal style lead - simple and melodious complete with muting. While they simply don't have the chance to match the speed of the drums, the guitars still manage to get some amazing mileage on the short songs. In the end, the extreme of the genre is about raw intensity and raging aggression, both of which are in more then abundant supply on this recording. I often find it hard to say good things about such music, but this album is just done so well there isn't anything bad to say about it. It makes me want to break stuff! -Neil St. Laurent

UNLEASHED --"Warrior" 1997 CD

(Century Media Records)

The Nordic soldiers of death metal storm their way thru with the brand new album, fifth in the line. Their debut "Where No Life Dwells" was/is one of my fave death metal albums. While they added a couple new influences into their music, for the most part they still brutalize and pummel with intensity!. Unlike the once great and now washed up label mates Grave, Unleashed are still heavy as fuck and are out to crack skulls. They spare nothing on this record and have thirteen tracks. My fave tune lyrically is "Death Metal Victory," in which Hedlund shouts out "Death metal is here to stay...my warriors scream for me, death metal victory!" Hells yeah!!. Sound the trumpets of battle, arm thy self, mount your steed and ride true warriors of metal, for Unleashed are leading the charge!.

BRUTAL TRUTH "Sounds Of The Animal Kingdom" 1997 CD (Relapse Records)

Okay here is the thing, I thought B.T.'s debut album "Extreme Responses... an out and out masterpiece and a death/grind bible of sorts. So, in other words, it would be a difficult thing for B.T. to surpass that with me as they are a vastly different band now. I surmised their next release after the debut, the "Perpetual Conversion" EP to be an absolute piece of garbage, a mistake, a blunder and not even worth the mention I just gave!. On their 2nd album (last for Earache), "Need To Control" I didn't mind that and it's heavy and intense moments, but was consistantly weighed down with slow bouts of boring industrial/ambient atmospherics. Then the comeback (and label switch), "Kill Trend Suicide" EP which saw a rawer and heavy Brutal Truth emerge, which I quite enjoyed and welcomed. Now with their third LP, we have a melding of "Kill..." and parts of "Need To Control" with a lot more of a hardcore/punk flavour and some groovy sections. Which bring to mind far too much, bassist Dan Liker's side project Exit 13 on their "Ethos Musick" CD. It is very evident on "Sounds..." the Brutal Truth have taken ample amounts of the influence from the American hardcore/punk and to a lesser extent European and Japanese hardcore movements. I do miss the controlled chaos of their debut album, but it seems sadly they will never make a return in that direction. This album as it stands on it's own, is a good record and even rages some with some undeniable might. As well vocalist, Kevin Sharp, shows he is a good vocalist and he uses a lot of tones and ranges, thus far untapped, to bring out emotion in the music. Having said that, they are not overdone. The funky parts ride the edge of the annoying line and if expounded upon in the future, will take B.T.'s music for an ugly turn. This is a good album with a cool muddly live feel to it, though a great album it is not!. I am very interested to see where this band goes next. It could be good, but has the potential for disaster.

ETERNAL SOLSTICE "Demonic Fertilizer" 1997 CD (Displeased Records)

The cover art totally rocks! You just have to see it. The artist, Paul De Ward, is someone to keep an eye on. Vocalist, Ramon, has some great tools and uses them with growls that are laid back at points and aggressive at others, but always decently intelligible without losing extremity. The drum work is interesting and competent throughout, and the tunes are spiced with some kickin' guitar solos. Eternal Solstice play dirty, begrimed and melodic death metal. While tuneful and interesting they (the band) occasionally slip into monotonous sections and at others fail to land that knock out punch to put them over the top.



DEICIDE "Serpents Of The Light" 1997 CD (Roadrunner Records)

Well Deicide are back with a new blasphemic platter, to batter and bruise all who dare a listen. Their self-titled debut album was a raw lesson in cult deathrash metal, as well their 2nd record was also an amazing release, with a much more technical flavor, but never backing down one iota on ferociousness. I liked the third record "Once Upon The Cross" for the most part, but I thought it was marred by some very average, filler type of material. So now sits before us "Serpents Of The Light," which has ten tracks and weighs in a bit light at 31 minutes, but it wouldn't be a Deicide record if it didn't hover around the half hour mark. Still here are the trademark killer guitar solos and catchy chorus lines. The songs this time shine much brighter than "Once Upon..." and are much more consistent, with some new spices to the old sound without taking away any of it's power or overall appeal. Take a song like "Slave To The Cross", it starts off with a guitar solo in the opening moment of the track. amongst a weird riff, that oddly enough reminds me of a heavier version of the main riff in Twisted Sister's "You Can't Stop Rock 'N Roll". Then quickly breaks into a nice brutalizing trademark Deicide riff with speedy punch that is melded with flowing lyrical passages such as "Reign of the cross, the aggressor, has killed more people than cancer...", and ends in a flurry with Eric and Brian switching off solo piercings. This is a great come back album for Deicide, their most mature record to date and a nice rebound after the not so great third album.

MESHUGGAH "The True Human Design" 1997 MCD (NBA/PHD Canada)

Do any of you out there recall this bands debut LP "Contradictions Collapse". I do and I loved it. It was a superb blend of death metal with a little jazz and old school speed metal.

They managed to pull off a hodge podge like that nicely. However, since that point they have totally dropped the old school metal and jazz parts. In addition, they incorporated to the little bit of death metal influence in their music, maybe not incorporated lets say borrowed from heavily from bands like Pantera and Machine Head. Now first I must say they write compositionally sound music. Too bad their music is now garbage that bows to whatever seems to be the flavor of the day metallically. As a result, I have lost any respect I had for them. Fans of Machine Head and Pantera-isms on a second rate level, check into this. There is really only one new song here, the other is a live one and a ultra gay reworking dance/industrial thing that makes me ill. Nuclear Blast America, Box 43618, Philadelphia, P.A. 19106, USA.



ROTTING CHRIST -"A Dead Poem" 1997 CD (Century Media Records)

I became quickly a fan of this band after listening to the first materials released. Such as the '90 Promo/ Rehearsal, '89 + '92 demo tapes "Satanas Tedeum" & "Ade's Winds... respectively, as well as their 1991 7" EP "Dawn Of The Iconoclast". I was hooked at this point, but became utterly addicted to the dark death/black metal sound on the Rotting ones '92 Mini-LP "Passage To Arcturo" and the debut full-length "Thy Mighty Contract". A band whose atmospherics where both uplifting and suffocating, with a very cult air about them. Now Rotting have chosen a very different path (exit Wampyr Doaloth) and that is one of a mainstream symphonic metal bandwagon direction. It is undeniable some of the new material is emotional and at times extremely catchy. However, most of the qualities that made R.T. a beloved band to me have been stripped away and watered down. Very clear understandable vocals lead the way, upbeat riffing and a very boring trendy sound, that is too clean, too slow. It becomes very obvious over the ten tracks on "A Dead Poem" that R.T. are writing no longer for themselves, but what they think people will want to hear. Just sickening! I didn't expect another "Non Serviam" carbon copy, but I would take that over this at least it would sound honest.

GROPE "Desert Storm" 1997 CD (Die Hard/PHD Canada)

Well I don't know a whole lot about Grope. The only thing I have heard by them is on the Slatanic Slaughter - "Slayer Tribute" CD. I have heard this band described as "stoner rock" and "Kyuss meets C.O.C." and both are not totally accurate, but a fair description nonetheless. Mid-paced rockers with very normal and groovy riffs. Clean vocals not

unlike the aformentioned Kyuss and drumming is solid but does nothing to stand out at all. Fifteen trax of laid back hard rock with some of usual trendy sounds of the alterno scene. CREMATORY "Awake" 1997 CD (NBA/PHD Canada)

Not to be confused with the killer brutal death act from Sweden (R.I.P.) from the early '90's. This is the German one that plays a kind of part symphonic, part progressive and part metal. All stirred into a mixing pot, and hits on a few nice moments, however few and far between. Actually Crematory is quite average, talented and solid, but still very unexceptional. Any cool sections Crematory comes up with are smothered and overpowered with heavy keyboards, rendering their original intent null and void. The recording is very nice I must say, topped off with a cartoonish cover and lovey dovey lyrics, but I digress...

DECEASED "Fearless Undead Machines" 1997 CD (Relapse Records)

At a time when even I thought it wasn't possible to do pure power metal and have something interesting, Deceased comes across with potentially the best guitar driven speed metal in a very long time. Right from the start, the first track "The Silent Creature" delivers some very original sounding guitar work.

Mark Adams and Mike Smith simply never let
up with their driving stringed assault. The solos are somewhat slower than the rest; they engage themselves in some more intricate patterns than the break-neck speed of the remainder of the album would allow. A pleasant interlude, "Contamination", follows the first track and basically sums up the twisted B-rated horror movie theme of the album. Song after song of the living dead walking the earth and killing the living are to follow this eerily melodious introduction. And backing the guitars - The drums pound away relentlessly, complete with double-bass rumbling and thundering blast beats that add to the already deep music. Mike Bossier manages to capture the grandeur of the drums and to mix it such that it accentuates the guitars without being overwhelming and without being lost in the mix. In summary, this album is truly excellence in guitars. If you haven't heard any good power metal since 1989, then this album will be sure to please you. Also, I'm not sure what it is, but this album has a death metal feel to it; any extremist out there should derive great enjoyment from "Fearless Undead Machines". -Neil St. Laurent

OVERKILL "From The Underground And Below" 1997 CD (CMC

International) Can another old thrash band, that I loved from the old days, put out something truly brutal, catchy and relevant ala Testament on their new opus!?. In this instance the answer is negative!, as Overkill are sounding very tired and played out now. Some will look back to old albums and recall piles and piles of great heavy as fuck riffing, which now have been cast aside for a simpler, plain and more accessible sound, that is just not Overkill. Bobby Blitz's vocals have far too much effect on them, sounding like a mechanized brat. A lot of mechanized parts are incorporated and for me drain the power and life out of the songs, whose song structures are limp and run-of-the-mill. They also try their hand at a couple of power balladish tunes that sound out of place. I mean, what are they going for?, a heavier version of Alice In Chains!?. Well, in any case, I'm gonna use this for a coaster to set my coffee on, while I listen to a real metal album like "Years Of Decay"!.

FLESHGRIND "Destined For Defilement" 1997 CD (Pulverizer Records) "Whacked" opens the disc, in a flurry of

"Whacked" opens the disc, in a flurry of grinds, shouldered by the strength of catchy, brutal riffing, starts things off in one hell of fine moshable fashion!. The gory topics mixed with mob violence are vocalized in fine flowing form. Well, that is, they flow as smoothly as an old built to last lawnmower, powered by acid fuel!. Fleshgrind are to put it mildly a brutal death/grind act, who execute some interesting, varied metal with intense heaviness and post-haste!. Long live death metal!!! Arrrggghh!. REGENCY "Self-Titled" 1997 MCD (Thunder Productions)

French progressive heavy rock/power metal, that delves into territories previously treaded by bands like Queensryche, Dream Theater, Fates Warning and the like. Nice production, the sound is full. I hear some moody sections from this talented band, that conjure up "Operation Mindcrime". Singer, Olivier Guillaume, has a silky voice that flows out over the composition's with elegance and ease; interrupted occasionally by Olivier's thick accent and irregular pronunciation. A strong moment for me is the opening section of "Lost In A Hate's Sea", with it's gloomy feel, skillfully propelled along by piano and hand drums, intermingling brief moments of dark silence. UNLORD -"Schwarzwald" 1997 CD (Displeased Records)

Holy fuck!! This album, straight off the opening seconds grabs you by the throat and bashes you unmercifully upside the head, in rapid succession, showing no mercy!. Unlord play unholy fast black metal, with the furiousity of Dark Funeral and Sodom(i.e. "In The Sign Of Evil"!) alongside the majesty and class of Emperor and Thy Serpent!. This album is planting itself indefinitely in my CD carousel!. I mean this material is really great and some may beg to differ, but this sounds very fresh and invigorating to me!. I need not say too much more, except this album is destined to be a classic!. Choked full of speedy sections, interspersed with grandoise magic, yes black metal brutality at it's finest!. DISINTER -"Desecrated" 1997 CD (Pulverier Records)

It continues to amaze me how good and prolific the brutal death metal scene is in Illinois!. Champoining this scene (and the death metal scene in general) is Pulverizer records, for that they have my respect. Disinter play a form of dark and heavy death metal, mid-paced for the most part. The band hammer their way thru 10 tracks of death/grind might and mayhem. Highlighted by the gravel growls of 'Evil' Ed, the heavy eroding bass of 'Bats', the twisted riffage of Mike and the pounding thunder of Dave(ex-Funeral Nation). SMELLS LIKE TEAM SPIRIT II - "Displeased Records Comp." 1997 CD (Displeased Records)

Another low priced sampler compilation out, this the second installment in the series. I am going to give a brief overview of each band, wish me luck!:

<u>ALITAR</u>. Returning with material lifted from their 2nd LP "Ego Art", Altar played fast, intense death metal on the first album. However, on this new song, they have opted for slower, heavy sections mixed with speedier moments. Adding some weight to their attack, and regrettably loosing some of their brutality and craziness.

<u>God Dethroned</u> - Extreme and heavy blackness with serious death metal overtones. Pounding music barbaric and yet smooth and flowing with abyssic rasps. Good stuffl.

<u>Consolation</u> - Spewing riff laden, sharp and torrential death metal wit gruff, understandable vox

Elemal Solstice - See album review elsewhere. Unlord - See LP review elsewhere. Inford - See LP review elsewhere. Infernal Majesty - What can be said about a track lifted from, one of the all time black thrashing metal classics!?, hail the Canadian kings!!. Nembrionic - Some ragingly heavy and brutal metal, with some serious drums pounds going on. Red Harves! - A little different pace here, some laid back semi-heavy riffing. With clean dreamy vocals, sporting a slight industrial tinge on them. R.H. have a symphonic flavor to their music and to be quite honest, I really don't like this band. Sadist - See album review elsewhere. Hybernoid - Fucking weird shit!, Goofy samples mixed with some sort of tribal beat and kind of happy sounding riffs. Yuck!. SVARTSYN "The True Legend" 1997 CD (Folter Records)

Fast and raw, Swedish black metal featuring in it's ranks an ex-Dark Funeral drummer. Eight sinister trax of hateful darkness, that is blazing and can be quite harsh. I don't often really care too much whether the production and sound are top notch. But, in this case, the thinness of it is truly a detractor to the overall power of the music. The song structures are not overly amazing, however the tunes are fast and rather catchy. A cool moody mist like atmospheric feel permeates the disc and is quite enjoyable. GRAVE "Extremely Rotten Live" 1997 CD (Century Media Records)

Well, this was recorded live on the bands North American tour during a show in Corona, California. It features 15 tracks highlighted by "Reborn Miscarriage", a song from their old demo tape "Corpus Humani". Which is cool, though it is unfortunate after the departure of Jorgen Sandstrom, they went gay, with the "Hating Life" album!. Which was hinted at on their truly sad cover rendition of a Celtic Frost tune on the Dwell Records tribute "In Memory Of...". I have in my collection, a glorious live video bootleg of Grave from 1992, in Minnesota. Which was a lordly, commanding performance of intense death metal ferocity!. Now I listen to this, and first off the vocals are sub-par, dry and forced sounding, to the point of it being painful to listen to. They plod their way listlessly through some grand classics of yesteryear. Along side their "Hating Life" sleep inducing material. I really wish these boys would have kept their integrity intact (ala Carcass members changing their name to Black Star), and changed their name!. DE INFERNALI -"Symphonia De Infernali" 1997 CD (NBA/PHD Canada)

Ha ha! Oh man, what a load of crap! This is a keybored only ambient project by Jon of Dissection; and, I find it quite funny. If anyone used to read an old mag I wrote for The Sepulchral Voice, in issue # 14. Ali The Metallion interviewed Jon where he had this to say and I quote "metal has nothing (to do) with wimpy, soft instruments. That's why we (Dissection) don't use keyboards, because it's a wimp's music's instrument!". What does that make you Jon?, a wimp and a hypocrite!?. This album mixes the usual brand of keyboard/ambient with a big dose of techno/dance music and slight gothic and industrial sprinklings. The industrial parts make Ministry sounds as heavy as shit! Jon does vocals on some trax, some mechanized vocals and some cleanly sang vocals. This is really gay. I love Dissection but this is just plain awful!. Just as an aside due to recent developments, it truly does appear as though Jon, has warped values and no mind of his own...

MANGLED "...In Emptiness" 1997 MCD (Wild Rags Records)

Dirty death metal that gives these ears pleasure. I hear the band incorporating '80's metal guitar leads and doomy sections of gargantuan proportions!. Singer, Pepjin Howen, does a great job as he blasts and bellows his throaty growl, through two studio + one live track of grisly "grave rock". \$8 US(Includes postage) from Wild Rags.

RAZOR -"Decibels" 1997 CD (Hypnotic Records)

The Canadian speed/thrash metal kings return, with Bob Reid, the vocalist from last few Razor albums intact. Composer, Dave Carlo, throws out killer riff after killer riff as he shreds his way through these ten tracks. I can't say enough about the riffing - it is so heavy and catchy!. However, there are a few things that bug me about this album starting off with the effects on Reid's usually great vocals they dampen things a bit for me. Secondly, some of the lyrics are cool, but some others are just too contrived sounding, such as "Jimi The Fly" and "Goof Soup" The songs are good, heavy, solidly structured with a nice production job Brought to you once again by Hypnotic Records the Canadian retro metal resurrectors, with such other acts as Anvil and Voivod. MEMORY GARDEN "Tides" 1996 CD (Heathendom Records)

Well, the Swedish meisters of clean doom ala Candlemass return, in a bit of a disappointing fashion. Memory Garden have polluted their pure classic doom metal style with '90's flavor riffing in spots, not so far removed from acts like Machine Head and Meshuggah. The vocals are no longer disparate and melancholy as in the past, but more like a clean gothic/progressive metal styled. M.G. surely know how to structure and compose some splendid songs. However, they are badly mired by these new elements that have been forced onto the tunes. Classic doom fans steer clear you will be disappointed!. VOLATILE "Quarantine" 1997 MCD (Warhead Records)

There are some really cool things going on and these boys have some killer ideas, along with the odd sweet riff. However, their style seems very unclear and a real mish mash. I Know this is a MCD, but I think the band should have worked on things a little more before issuing something on disc. One thing is for sure, these blokes are having some good fun and let us in on it with some good laughs, the pigs ha ha. You just never do know with those Aussie's do ya!?. Australia rocks!. HYPOCRISY "The Final Chapter" 1997 CD (NBA/PHD Canada)

Enter into the final chapter of a great Swedish death metal band. A fitting and heavy handed maelstrom like end it is too! For me it is hard for Hypocrisy to top their debut "Penetralia". I remember going nuts over it when it first came out. Hypocrisy of today is a scarcely slowed down entity, who's maturity shows in spades. The fluidity and texture of compos are superb, and the execution top notch. Hypocrisy's main man, Peter Tagtgren, produced the record in his studio with dizzingly clear and mighty effect!. Some of leads and guitar exploits are weaved in a very gelling and effective, heavy and catchy manner. Fave song for me is "Dominion" with its heavy and rapid Swedish style riffing, killer soloing intro, straight into a flurry of hard hitting and precise drum beats and a singable chorus line. For my personal tastes this stomps holes in everything Hypocrisy has done since the first LP! Large points also for the crushing cover of "Evil Invaders" by Canada's own Razor. Slight demerits to Nuclear Blast or Hypocrisy whoever was responsible for the bare bones CD booklet with lyrics to only the title track, three pics including the cover and not much else!. Lyrics, by the way, still very much in the paranormal/extraterrestrial vein. Check this out!!.



DEATH PENALTY -"Bitter" 1997 MCD (Wild Rags Records)

Not very good at all. Weak metalcore stuff, with slight industrial overtones. The singer kinda bugs me. He sings with very little depth and conviction, and sounds like a toad doing a death metal voice while pretending he is a vulture ha ha. Anyway, the music is fairly heavy, not brutal, and mid-paced. The material is very minimal, and always seems like it is missing something like we have the skeletons of the songs still being fleshed out. Overall, a weak release. Avoid it. Same price as the other Wild Rags CD on this page.

SKINLAB - "Bound, Gagged And Blindfolded"

1997 CD (Century Media Records) I was interested to hear this, as there has been a lot of talk on this band. It features a former member and music composer, Steev Esquivel, of an old thrash band I liked Defiance with their "Void Terra Firma" album. Skinlab is a melodical, mid-paced sort of thrashcore act. I like Skinlab's heaviness but they sound far too contrived for my tastes. Skinlab knows how to make catchy music, but sound like they are trying to be what everyone wants to hear and not what they love to play They blend elements from bands like Machine Head, Kyuss, Alice In Chains, Meshuggah, Pantera and the like. Also, the vocals are very reminiscent of Phil Anselmo to the point of embarrassment. The musicianship is very good and if you like what I have described check 'em out. If you are like me and do not care for crap like this, pass it up in a hurry cause it chews man!

PANTERA "Official Live 101 Proof" (Eastwest Records)

Pantera, who have dethroned Metallica as kings of Heavy Metal have always been renowned for their killer live shows. On "Official Live", the intensity of a Pantera gig is showcased on a powerful, extreme 70+ minute opus that will convince even Pantera's biggest critic that they are a premier live act. Dimebag, Rex, Vinnie and Phil Anselmo have never sounded better, as have live albums. "Official Live..." is the shit! -Pat Warner



Interview with Arch Enemy

Interview by: Arto Lehtinen with vocalist Johan Liiva

- 1. Hmm to start out this interview process I could ask firstly what you have been doing lately with Arch Enemy!?
- J: Eh, not much really. We've had a period of relaxation since we got back home from the European and Japan-tour this spring, but just recently we started some intense songwriting for our next album (yet untitled!), so I guess we now have about 6-7 new songs that's gonna blow everyones head off, of course...
- 2. Arch Enemy have been described and advertised as some sort of reunion of Carnage because of consisting of you and Michael Ammot, even originally you were supposed to come out with the Carnage name, but turned down after all. Obviously you were not practically keen and pleased with that kind of reunion



- J: Nah, that's true I guess. It was meant as a "return of Carnage" but it felt a bit pathetic, so we decided to do a totally new band with another name and line-up and all that. ARCH is much more "modern" in many ways compared to Carnage, much due to that fact it's been half a decade since we did Carnage and that we now have matured and developed in many ways, musically as well as personally. Arch is a 100% more improved band than Carnage ever was or would be. It feels more complete nowadays with new ideas and influences, Mike's brother Chris' fretboardvirtousity to fresh up the sound with... yeah, the widening of limits for what we feel that we can achieve means a lot when it comes to this band. I guessreuniting Carnage would feel strange in a way.
- 3. What circumstance lead to make you gather together to start playing again ?! And how did you end up in picking up this Arch Enemy name ?!
- J: Well, Mike and I had talked about this for a while, so when our first recordcompany WAR offered us a deal we got down to business so to speak and wrote "Black earth". We felt very inspired to make music together again and I feel that the result represents 5-6 years of our individual development/improvement when we had very little or non contact during that period. It feels great to play to Mike again, and not to forget the great guys we play with, they're totally professional considering the experience that they have.

About the name, we got it from a band who did only but one rehearsaldemo late 80's, american sado-deathmetal, yeah!

- 4.Michael's brother is also involved in Arch Enemy as the second guitarist...hmm... Do they find a lot of common as brothers usually do, or do they have a clear picture of how to play and what to play that no content would arise between them? Does Michael's brother have any background in the past?!
- J: Chris has played for just a couple of years now, but his development as a guitarist is extreme. His way of playing is similar to Mike's, but at the same time different; he's not as sadistic in his style as Mike is (haha) and he's much more faster when it comes to technical stuff. They are very tight and well-played together during solos, pedal-work stops on a dime and as far as I know they really enjoy being in the same band.

Background... well, Chris has been in a band or two, I am not really sure, but he's getting into the action pretty well in Arch.

- 5. How did you get hooked up by Wrong Again Rec. to issue the "Black Earth" cd !? Have any so called bigger labels pointed out their interest by signing Arch Enemy now ?!?
- J: As I said earlier, Mike and I started Arch and then our friends at WAR released and paid for the album, so... that's about it. ... Yeah we've been contacted by a couple of bigger labels as well as smaller ones, but at the moment we take it cool you know, we're not on WAR anymore, so we'll just wait and see who comes up with the best offer and if all sucks we release it by ourselves. No big deal, we are not stupid.
- 6. Back to Carnage...Did you ever get entirely annoyed with Michael and other Carnage dudes in the first place when the only



one Carnage album was recorded an done completely without you and the current Dismember growler Matti Kärki teamed up with them to do the whole job instead ?!?

J: Of course I was totally pissed off with Mike and Fred !! Who wouldn't get annoyed when you were about to record your first album? I had this idea of a totally brutal album because a lot of people really liked Carnage, but then all of a sudden they wanted Matti to do the vocals on the album so I was out. But when looking back and so on I must admit that the kind of death metal that you hear on "Dark recollections" suits better together with Matti's voice than my grunting-style, so... but in my personal opinion that albumwas held-back by the sound, it lacks a bit of power and savage brutality that for example their debut. But it's history now Dismember managed to get on

10. After dismissing Carcass Michael Ammott formed Spiritual Beggars, has his spiritual beggars been put on hold for a while or just ceased to exist entirely ?!

J: Beggars just finished recording their new album in June, so they are still rockin'... The heaviest shit ever heard!

11. Well you used to work on your Furbowl at that time !?

J: Yeah, that's true. We managed to release 2 albums ("Those shredded dreams" and "The autumn years") and 1 demo ("The nightfall of your heart") + 2 more demos for promotion only. We also toured a lot with Therion (life metal you know haha) and the last show was at the Hultsfred-festival (One of the biggest festivals in Sweden A.L.) in '94. It was great to play with Furbowl, but I was very tired of music after 3 years so I quit in the fall '94... They formed a new band called Wonderflow and signed to MNW and released a 5-track cd, they played a melodic version of metal/hardrock/pop with rather normal vocals and so on, pretty good actually but not my cup of tea in the long run. Furbowl was cool though, we recorded all our stuff in a small "cottage" with very simple equipment and very low-budget... I am very pleased with most of the songs on "Autumn years", check it out if you can find it, distribution is extremely welltaken care of !

12. Arch Enemy did a tour with Cathedral in the "land of the rising sun" aka Japan, apparently the tour turned out to be such a magnificent experience, right ?!?

J: Yeah, it was fucking great really! We played 3 shows with Cathedral (2 in Tokyo and 1 in Osaka) and had the best respond ever and can't be compared to the European crowd (paralyzation guaranteed). We had at least 1000 people in the crowd each show and on day 2 the Japanese MTV filmed the entire show and interview that became half an hour broadcast together with Cathedral. The whole arrangement and organization was a 100% professional, there were 20-30 people involved in everything



so it really moved smoothly all the way. The best thing was that the sound on stage was crystal clear and that the sound out was extremely loud! It reall felt powerful...

- 13. As far as I know you have done some dates in Central Europe, mainly in Germany. What sort of respond have you received from the audience, have people shouted at the top of their lungs f:ex the Carcass name because of Ammott or have they asked you to perform tracks of either Carnage or Carcass !?!?
- J: I think I heard Carcass quite a few times, haha... some wanted to hear Crnage as well, but we hadn't rehearsed "Torn apart" at that time, so... The respond was OK I guess, especially in Weimar it was total chaos (well...), Berlin was cool because of the atmosphere and Holland (can't recall city's name) was total skunk!? We played with a few bands, Dew Scented and Orth, cool guys and some Italian band which I can't remember... It was truly "wild"...
- 14. Mtv and Viva have shown your videoclip on occasion, how did a chance of making a video come about ?!? Did Wrong Again label support financially or how ?!?
- J: Yeah, WAR had to clean their bank accounts entirely when they received the invoice from th Dick. So it's been broadcast already ?! Amazing ! Everything happens so fast around here... heh...
- 15. This one has always been my mandatory question; What sort of music do the Arch Enemy guys usually listen to nowadays ?!?!
- J: Peter (drums) loves technodeath, Dark Angel, Cynic, Atheist but also some funky shit, Jamiraquay (I got that right of course) and stuff like that. Martin (bass) loves Manowar and Maiden, well, he listens to everything that's got bass on it. Chris (guitar) is into a lot of guitarstuff, Maiden, Helloween and Ozzy. Almost everything with complex solo's... Mike (guitar) is hot on Sabbath, Free, Trouble, Slayer and old death metal (Master/Deathstrike) etc. Myself, Johan (vocals), I am into Cathedral, Soundtrack or Our Lives, Nefilim and some death metal as Master, Devastation/Sindrome, Repulsion etc. The whole band listens to a lot of different stuff and it changes from day to day...
- 16. Ok when can we expect to hear a new cd by Arch Enemy and what else shall the future look for you and some funny words to conclude the interview ?! Ok Tack så mycket och lycka till med Arch Enemy !!
- J: The next release will take place late this year/ early '98, check it out. It will be ten times heavier and more melodic than "Black earth", still totally metal! Cheers Arto for this interview and for being one of my first penpals in the underground! (Thank you...I am flattered now!) STAY LETHAL-STAY METAL

ROBED IN EXILE -

"Serenity Fades" Demo 1997

Opening with an acoustic medley the odd sensation of the band becomes immediately present. What on the surface sounds somewhat like standard black metal, "Serenity Fades" is somehow different from the masses. The often overdone keyboard element has been replaced by nothing more than a guitar. A clean or acoustic guitar melody placed in the middle of the song, or an actual lead guitar sound, not just that blazing rhythm we're so used to, maintains that raw sound so many in the genre hoped for, while at the same time adding the dimension of atmosphere. There is a focus on structure and transition rather than simply excessive speed and high pitch shricking; with the only known parallel to be drawn is to Ophthalamia, without of course the benefit of such a level of production. It is black metal minus the cheese and monotony. Robed In Exile's "Serenity Fades" is a fresh approach to this usually uninventive genre. This demo has an excessive amount of energy and aggression maintained in the very raw, yet at times strangely atmospheric music. SUBVERSION - "Foul" Demo 1997

I had heard something about this band, what perked my interest was it was said to feature the killer ex-Process singer. I could tell right off the first foray of this 5 tracker "Murder Most Foul" that the rumors were in fact correct. The music itself is fast and intense, while granted the chaos made a few compos come off as muddled. Subversion has a wide mix of punk/ hardcore/thrash/ death metal with a few speedy grinds peppered throughout. Yes, a mixed bag; but an explosive bag of tricks. Things don't get any clearer with vocalist Jim Huhn, a true talent. He effortlessly switches from insane half spoken/half sung vox to punk/hardcore shouts to pure clean ones to a couple different textures of the death growl. Fucking crazy, huh!?. ARES KINGDOM - "Promo Tape" 1997

I won't go on about who makes up this band. It is quite interesting, but read the Eternal Darkness interview to find out more. This is one truly powerful band. The sheer extremity is thoroughly steeped with some intense, catchy, and melodical music. This is the promo tape for the cassette EP which is being released on Eternal Darkness Creations as I write this. HOSTILE -

"Behind The Eyes" Demo 1998 Hostile is an all around metal band; but, it leans heavily towards slowish doom, mixed with the types of riffs often seen from bigger death and thrash bands (i.e.clean and heavy, chugging, stop-on-adime, hell you know what I mean!? Ha ha). Hostile is a six member band with two vocalists. The male vocalist mainly sounds like an old bearded pirate - hoarse and gruff. His vocals are done in a kind of half spoken/half sung manner. The female vocalist, Lina, does mainly clean vocals. I am pretty sure she does the black metal vox, which are very powerful!. On the opening track "No Life," both vocalists sing simultaneously juxtaposed on top of each other to a very cool and kind of chilling effect. TWISTED TOWER DIRE "Triumphing True Metal" Promo Tape 1997

As you can imagine from the title of this tape, I got my hopes up and very excited to check this out. My copy has 3 tracks, 2 that were on the original "Triumphing..." promo and a new '98 (I believe?) tune entitled "Mourner In The Mist". T.T.D. carry proudly the day of '80's metal bands such as Maltese Falcon, Iron Maiden, Acid, Mercyful Fate, Grim Reaper, Oz and Manowar to name a few. I have never heard anything by this band, but know that they have out a split seven incher with Cold Mourning, which I am very

interested in checking out. Something people will note straight off is the vocalist is a woman - and a very talented one at that! To my surprise, her voice does what few other female voice's can do to metal music and that is compliment it. Her voice is pure silk and she slides across all the needed ranges with such ease and agility. while still embodying the emotion the music commands. T.T.D. tend to slip now and then into the hard rock arena but generally stick with some great heavy/power metal gallops and chugging, that makes my head violently bang!. The innards here are above average with some nicely lengthed reviews (numbering 80+). Just as an intro to this interview, I must say a few words. This is a rather old interview. It was originally intended for The Sepulchral Voice, a mag I wrote for. Anyway, Mike the editor of the T.S.V., decided since Rotting took a fairly lengthy period to answer that he wasn't going to bother printing it, saying "if they don't care to give it any priority getting done, I don't want to print it." So, whatever! Mike and I disagreed on many issues and this was one of them. However, we were good friends through any differences. To make a long story longer (ha!), I am printing it now. I feel I owe it the band and I called Kory (vocals) the man interviewed and we discussed things. And, I have included a short update following the interview to bring this interview into a fresh time period.





 Could you give a brief history of the band and it's members? What do you guys do outside the band for entertainment???.

Allright. Well, we started in the fall of 1992. Since then, we've had 3 demos: "Christcrusher", "Human Race Liquidation", and "Drown In Rotting Flesh". We played numerous shows, with such bands as: Mundane, Oppessor, Incantation, Kataklysm, Suffocation, and many others. Myself (Kory), I do the vocals. Jeff White does guitar. And

Keith Devry plays drums. At the moment we have two guys (Derek and James) helping out. I can't speak for anyone else in the band for entertainment outside the band. I'm into horror movies, wrestling, drinking beer and young girls(you sick bastard you!! ha -Dale).

2. What's the scene like in the Newmarket area? Also, I know you did a few shows with Gorguts/Opressor on their minitour of Canada. How was that? Finally, a mini-tour promoted by yourselves which was to include Manitoba, Ontario, Ouebec and a few stateside dates, did this happen yet???.

I'm not sure what the scene is like here in Newmarket yet. We really haven't actually played a show here yet. I do know a lot of people here are into the heavier side of music. We're planning on playing a heavy music fest here soon. We done one in Barrie two years back, and shit loads turned out. The Opressor/Gorguts thing was pretty cool. The mini-tour promoted by ourselves has not happened yet, but will soon!(I am quite sure it has not happened still as of yet -Dale).

3. How many copies of the last demo "Drown In Rotting Flesh" sold thus far? How have individual buyers reacted to it? How was the recording process of "D.I.R.F." like? And, what did the recording costs amount to???.

An actual number is unknown, but it is quite a bit. The reaction from buyers has been great! Most people that have wrote have said "D.I.R.F." is fucking brutal stuff. The recording process was only like 3 days to record and one and a half to mix and master. The recording cost like 800 dollars. It's a totally different story with our album coming out. So far we have been in the studio for like over two month's! (Fuck! Who do you think you are, Metallica? ha ha -Dale).

4. What do you think when people say the "death metal is dead or dying out"? Or is it more like the trendies are (both fans and bands) leaving or jumping onto the next bandwagon (i.e. hardcore/punk or black metal)? I think the scene is that much stronger for it (the trendies leaving I mean)!!!.

There is no fucking way death metal is dead! Yeah, it has slowed down a lot (for now) I will agree. I think the big problem is the press (such as one American mag I won't mention) talking so much shit. Maybe if they'd just shut their mouths, it wouldn't be as bad. I do think death metal will come back as strong a force on the music scene again within the next two years.

- 5. What are some of the bands that influenced Rotting in the early days, and what are you personally into these days? Also, on a completely different note, what do you think of Displeased Records re-releasing the mighty classic "None Shall Defy" by provincial mates Infernal Majesty (at the time of this interview it was just about to be released -Dale)!??.Some bands that influenced Rotting in the early days were Carcass, Slayer, Autopsy, Deicide, and many others. Personally, I am into almost everything. Some of the bands I'm totally into now are Dying Fetus, Six Feet Under, Tragically Hip (ugh -Dale), Weezer (Say it ain't so! -Dale), Pyrexia and Christ Inversion. Yeah, that's real cool about Infernal Majesty's "None Shall Defy" being re-released. They were a huge influence on Keith, our drummer.
- 6. You mentioned to me in your letter, that you were in the process of recording 11 songs to be released as a full-length entitled "The Unholiest Of All Penetrations" (See update plans changed-Dale). Since you mentioned no label I presume maybe you'll go the route of say Cryptopsy and get a Euro. label to release it over there and do the North American distribution yourselves? Also, what can people who heard the demo stuff expect from the album!??.

We're talking with a few labels about licensing deals. Other then that, I can't really say much about that. Anyone who hears the demo (material) can expect something way different. Off the(D.I.R.F.) demo we re-recorded the songs, "Voices" and "In Vain" for the

UPDATE

To bring things up to snuff here is what Kory relayed to me over the phone yesterday. Rotting shortly after the recording of the album split up for a few months and now have reformed with the following line-up: Kory Arnold (Vocals), Rob McAulay (Lead guitar), Rick Van Wissen (Rythmn guitar), Jeff White (Bass guitar) and Keith Devry (Drums). They are rehearsing and get shit back together, and plan to play shows at the start of the new year. By Feb. 1998, they will release a demo, which will be the aborted full-length CD on tape and can be ordered from Kory for 4 US everywhere. Said demo will not have the aborted album title. It will be entitled "Nothing But Attitude", and feature the following songs: "In Vain", "Sexually Tortured", "Laid To Rest", "Unholy Penetration", "Soul Burn", "Let Them Bleed", "Christian Castration", "Blood", "Guts", and "Evil I". Then they will prepare their new material for a release probably late spring or early summer - maybe in the form of a debut or another demo tape (we will see). Kory tells me everyone is dedicated to doing shit right and the new stuff is not a huge departure of brutal death metal style on the "Drowning In Rotting Flesh" Demo 1995. - 1. Can you introduce the band and give a quick history, to those not yet turned onto the 'Grind!??.

 Okay. Well, I, Steve Murray, play guitar; Rich Lipscomb vocals/guitar; Dave Barbolla drums; and Ray Vazquez bass. We formed in March of '93. In November of '93, we recorded our "Holy Pedophile" demo. We played lots of shows, did lots of mail, and then in April of '95, we recorded our "Sorrow Breeds Hatred(Bleed On Me)" demo. In January of '96, we replaced our original bass player, Casey Ryba, with our current bass player, Ray Vazquez. We then signed to Pulverizer Records; and, in August of '97, we put out our debut album, "Destined For Defilement".
- 2. How is the scene in Illinois? The death metal scene there seems fertile. Are there a lot of death metal bills? How are the crowd sizes and reactions at the gigs???.

The death scene in Illinois is pretty killer right now. Lots of good bands, such as: Opressor, Jungle Rot, Lividity, Sapphist, Euphoric Evisceration, Deaden, Broken Hope, Gorgasm, Hot Stove, Disinter, Sarcophagus, Num Skull, Artic Symphony, and others. The shows are usually pretty killer - good turn outs and crowd reactions. The major tours just started coming back here, cuz there was no where to play for a bit. But, it is back on track.

3. Describe the differences of recording your demos, as opposed to having a label budget for the album!?. Are you happy with the sound and production job by Brian Griffin (Guitarist of Broken Hope)???.

Well, we felt a little bit more pressure with us not paying for it. We had a very low budget to record our album. Brian Griffin went beyond the call of duty. He is amazing in the studio. I think it sounds great for a rushed low budget album. It was recorded and mixed in less then a week.

4. Do you like the recording process? Describe a day in the life of recording your debut album "Destined For Defilement"!?

Do you have all the songs completely finished and fleshed out (pun intended) before going into the studio???

I hate the recording process. Actually, it is tedious - rewarding, but tedious. We did the drums first, then bass, then guitars, then vox. When we recorded the drums (which were all done in one day) our drummer just played while I played the scratch tracks. It was quite the long day I must say. We have everything down before we go into the studio. The only thing that really changed was some harmonizing parts that were not planned out before we went into the studio.

5. What do you know about Canada? Your opinions on the Canadian scene and some bands you dig from here? Do you find there is a 'Canadian sound'???.

We have played in Canada a few times. We have played London, Ontario (once), Montreal (twice), Quebec City (3 times), and Rimouski (once) (all in the province of Quebec -Dale). We love it up there! The shows, when promoted right, are very good. Some killer bands are: Blood Of Christ, Rotting, Obscene Crisis, Cryptopsy, Kataklysm, Necrotic Mutation, Gorelust R.I.P.) were killer, Summertime Daises. I guess Canada has that hyper blast sound.

- 6. Now onto one of my fave questions. What do you think about the album "Black Metal" by the almighty Venom!??.

 Sorry, I am not a Venom fan (gasp -Dale). Our drummer and bass player love them and that album though (Your drummer and bass player have good taste! -Dale).
- 7. Have you or would you like to do any out of state/country shows? At most shows do you at least break even or maybe make a couple bucks, to put back into the band or future show promotion???.

Like I mentioned, we have played Canada a few times, and love to play out of state shows. The only time we make money is if we play around here. Otherwise, we usually lose or break even. But, as long as we have fun that is all that matters (Fuckin' eh, bro!! - Dale).

- 8. What is the sickest thing you have ever seen or witnessed? Any funny or weird shit happen at gigs to tell us about!??. I knew theses medical students, and they took me into a room full of cadavers that they work on. It was great! A funny thing... Let's see. When we played Montreal this year, Rich was stomping on the stage and the stage broke and he fell in. That was quite hilarious!
- 9. Your lyrics obviously dwell in the gore field. That said, what are some of the sorted tales the lyrics go into? Are you of the opinion, that the vocalist should write the lyrics he sings???.

I wouldn't call the lyrics that I write gory. But, our bass players lyrics are on the gory side. My lyrics are based on true stories, usually about the Mafia or sex crimes. I don't think it matters who writes the lyrics.

10. What age/year did you discover metal and, then later, the underground scene? What were some of the first demos/'zines you ordered or came across? Do any of the members do any activities in the underground outside of the band???.

I was 16 years old, it was 1990 when I bought Death - "Scream Bloody Gore" (album). Before that, I was really into Slayer. My first demos were from local bands, such as Broken Hope. They turned me onto the underground. The band takes up a lot of our free time.

11. How does the writing process go? Does each member contribute, or does one person do the lion's share of writing and arranging the songs!??. Any new material written for the next LP; and, will it be on Pulverizer!??.

I guess I do the lion's share of the writing process. I write the majority of the riffs and lyrics. And me and the drummer work it all out. The other guys throw in occasional riffs and opinions. Currently, we have 2 songs written for the next album. We are taking it one album at a time with Pulverizer.

Do you see underground 'zines as a useful tool for labels and bands alike? Are they a vital part of keeping the scene alive

Zine's are an integral part of the underground. They let everybody know what is going on with little bands like us. Without them, promotion would be VERY hard.

MISELLANIA (Nonsense?)

The basis of the darksucker theory is that electric light bulbs suck dark. Take for example, the darksuckers in the room where you are right now. There is much less dark right next to the darksuckers than there is elsewhere, demonstrating their limited range. The larger the darksucker, the greater its capacity to suck dark. Darksuckers in a parking lot or on a football field have a much greater capacity than the ones in used in the home, for example.

It may come as a surprise to learn that darksuckers also operate on a celestial scale; witness the Sun. Our Sun makes use of dense dark, sucking it in from all the planets and intervening dark space. Naturally, the Sun is better able to suck dark from the planets which are situated closer to it, thus explaining why those planets appear brighter than do those which are far distant from the Sun.

Occassionally, the Sun actually oversucks; under those conditions, dark spots appear on the surface of the Sun. Scientists have long studied these 'sunspots' and are only recently beginning to realize that the dark spots represent leaks of high pressure dark because the Sun has oversucked dark to such an extent that some dark actually leaks back into space. 

This interview was conducted in conjunction with Dale Roy of Canadian Assault mag and Neil St. Laurent of Tracks Of Creation internet 'zine, who would like to send out many thanks and hails to Verminaard and Paulus, true brothers in metal!!!



C.A. Mag - Let's start off by telling us a little bit about the new album!?

Paulus - Buy it!

C.A. Mag - I did, but I haven't listened to it yet.

Paulus - What, did you pay for it? We don't know the price yet.

C.A. Mag - Cheap, ten bucks!

Paulus - Good. Canadians get it for ten.

<u>Verminaard</u> - Americans have to pay fifty! (laughter all around...) ...On the new one, there is a three song trilogy. The trilogy is kind of like a prequile to the "River...(Of Corticone)" saga. The main character in "River...", was Amemnon; and, the prequile is basically about how Amemnon was born, his rise to power and everything else. The other eight songs are individual stories, in their own right. They are not connected in any way.

Paulus - There will be another album to come as well.

Verminaard - Oh, definitely many more to come!

C.A. Mag - Cool, just no live shows eh!?

Verminaard - (Quickly snaps) Not in this town!

Paulus - Not in this town. There will (still) be live shows.

<u>Verminaard</u> - We'll still be going on. There's no way we are quitting. What you witnessed tonight was, probably by far, 10 times better then the other shows in Edmonton.

Paulus - Edmonton is dying. This metal here is shit! People are shit! That is what I have to say...there are true people here, some people, not many mind you but...

Verminaard - You can count them on one hand.

T.O.C. - Where, do you find the better scenes around Canada, or anywhere?

Verminaard - For the Canadian scene, it's not a big mystery that the Montreal area is the place to be...(pauses)...just cause they are full of freaks...(laughter)...but, I dunno. I talked to a lot of people around the world, and people complain about the scene wherever they live. Like...if you live in X, the scene in sucks in X. If you live in Y, the scene sucks in Y.

C.A. Mag - Ya, the scene sucks in Sweden, even though they have a million bands!

Verminaard - That's it! I've talked to people from Norway that say there's like 10 people at shows, and no one cares. And, there's

big wealth of bands there and still no one comes to shows.

Paulus - There was an explosion, basically an explosion of this new scene of black metal, that is where the new scene came fuckin' from...(pauses) And, mind you, I cannot talk. I haven't been there myself, but I've read interviews and so forth where they say the scene is shitty. They are happy when 50 people come...a hundred people come,. We had two hundred people here tonight!

Verminaard - Well, basically the scene over there, where there's a wealth of bands, is the same kind of live scene there is here. And, there's no bands (in Edmonton). Ya know, this town is getting better.

C.A. Mag - Ya, I have a lot of death and black metal shows from Europe, and lots of the time, they only get 75 people at these shows!

Paulus - You got that on video? I might have to write and get some stuff.

















C.A. Mag - Sure...So, are you happy with the production of the new album?

Verminaard - Oh, yeah!

Paulus - Yes, it blows "River..." away. Playing is much better. And production is much better.

Verminaard - Ironically, it was in a technologically inferior studio then we recorded "River..." in, but it is amazing how an engineer who understands where we are coming from helps. The guy that recorded "River...", he's ummm...(pauses)...adequate and he refuses to go beyond adequate, like I'm at this level and I don't care to go anymore. I mean, he's got an amazing studio and he can't use it. I mean he just can't! If we had the engineer, we used this time in that studio, I shudder to think what it could have sounded like!

C.A. Mag - So, you are not of the opinion, that certain bands such as Dark Throne, Swordmaster, and Grand Belial's Key need a dirty sound to play this kind of music!?

Paulus - I like raw production myself. I don't think our production's clean by any fuckin' means! I like raw production. That is what horde metal is, raw and nasty and fuck you in the face!

Verminaard - Ya, like not overproduced glam/terra fucking garbage.

C.A. Mag - Morrisound, home of the plastic sound!

Paulus - Mind you, our music is a bit more...

Verminaard - Extreme.


Paulus - ... Chaotic. You have to have you. Can't have that production on our sort of music...

Verminaard - Many! We are going to keep going until: a) either of my hands fall off, or b) I learn how to play!






















OCCULT STUDIES



Eliphas Levi is a controversial figure in the world of modern occultism. He is both highly regarded as an authority by some while others see him as a derivative romanticist.

Alphonae Louis Constant (Eliphas Levi) was born the son of a shoemaker in early 19th century France. He was taught in the ways of the church at St. Sulpice, becoming a deacon and taking the customary vow of celibacy. However he became distillusioned with church dogma and began teaching alternative doctrines. This resulted in his expulsion from the church and his mother's suicide. From then, Levi became a journalist with minor involvement in revolutionary politics, until in 1839 he was imprisoned after swriting a pamphlet entitled The Gompel of Liberty Following his release he surried a girl of 16 who later had the marrisage annubed.

He worsaicously perused the libraries of Paris for emoteric and ancient books and manuscripts. After his extensive research and conversations with many mystics, he theorized that ancient treatises on alchemy amagic wors written in code and if one was able to break this

code they would be able to discover the eternal secrets of the universe. In 1853 bronski died, an event that did not phase Levi, as he had already surpassed his master in knowledge. The following year Levi felt that he had attained enough knowledge to carry out some occult experiments he decided to evoke the spirit of the 1st century occultist Apellonius of Tyana. He prepared himself for three weeks by eating only vepetables, evociding people and having imaginery conversations with Apollonius. At the end of the three weeks Levi performed a ceremony of evokation in which he successfully made Apollonius appear before him. Apollonius did not speak verbally to Levi but communicated with him tekpathically/. On two more occasions Levi evoked Apollonius who answered Levi's questions on the occult sciences. A few months after the meetings with Apollonius, Levi published his book The Dogman of High Magic and its sequel Ritual of High Magic the following year. He went on to writer many more books, History of Magic (1861), The Eyr of the Grand Hysteries (1864) Falhes and Symbols (1864), Le Sorcier de Mendon (1865) and a few more. However, Levi's books sold only moderately during his lifetime and his magic attracted only minor attention. But posthumously he has become a major influence on western magic and he returned reincarrated in the form of Aleister Crowley who (like Levi himself) surpassed his in knowledge.

Sowas Eliphas Levi master occultist or an extravangant romanticist? Well, I have great respect for Levi, his books contain wast tracts of occult knowledge and are pretrymuch required reading for any student of the occult. However, it must be pointed out that Levi has little, if not no, relevance to Sataniss because, despite his distillusionment with the church, he persisted in his enalavement to Nazarene ideology. So be vary when you peruse the vorks of Levi.

ALBUM REVIEWS

VOIVOD -"Phobos" 1997 CD (Hypnotic Records)

Voivod are back, straight off touring, for the magnificent "Negatron" album. The band wasted little time putting together this new platter of flowing soundscape. One thing is certain with Voivod, they surely are not an immediate band. You don't put them on in one listen and love it. After the initial spins, you are left scratching your head in uncertain puzzlement. It takes a number of listens as well as a little effort. So, those with a short attention span may just not get ""Phobos" at all. The sounds on this album are so rich and sublime, it is hard to put into words what this band has transformed and beautifully mutated sonically, married with pure aggression and speed, performed with dizzying expertise. The vocals of Eric Forrest are superb and a perfect fit to the music. I have 3 video bootlegs of the "Negatron" tour shows, and this guy is almost better live!, a welcome addition after the departure of Snake. Take for example the title track, it starts off with soothing otherworldly space sort of leadin. Then breaks in a slow galloping riff that makes my adrenaline build in anticipation. The vocals kick in mimicking the song, slow and obscure and then the music takes off with speed and vigor and the vocals are more aggressive and in your face. The textures on this tune are so encompassing and stir many emotions in me: exhilaration, uneasiness, hypnotic suspension of thought, free flow of passionate feeling, anxiety, and fuck if the galloping main riff doesn't make me bang my fucking head!. This album from beginning to end is so good, songs like "The Tower", "Neutrino", and "Forlorn" are sure to win over the most hardened critic. Along side Unlord, this album for me ties for second best album of 1997, just a hair behind the new Testament!. I have tried hard to find detractors to this great album. After an exhaustive search I have found only two. The first is a trivial one the cover artwork of Away looks childish and amateurish. MORTAL DECAY "Sickening Erotic Fanaticism" 1997 CD (Pulverizer Records)

Out on Pulverizer is South Jersey's Mortal Decay, a brutish and immensely heavy death/grind band. Contained within the disc are ten tracks of heavy grinding death metal, melded with slow arduous guitar chugs and dancing catchy riffage. The drum work is brisk and snappy along with some nice dense growling from ex-Deathrune vocalist Kelley Izquierdo. I really dig the irrevocable, almost impatient atmosphere. I get a feeling from this album...I can't pinpoint the exact reason, but that this band would kill live! This is much recommended. Fanatic death heads will love this. Nice cover too boys!. AETURNUS -

"Beyond The Wandering Moon" 1997 CD (Hammerheart Records) After having heard and enjoying Aeturnus' '95 MCD, I was quite happy to see their album arrive in my mail box. It of course has the fine packaging one comes to expect from Hammerheart Records. Acturnus have lessened the pure black metal attack ever so slightly, incorporating symphonic touches along with epic structuring. Pushing the envelope of the overall pieces of black art, while still steeped with a nice cold atmosphere. I hear in the new compos and riffing some influence, though not overbearing of mostly Burzum and later viking era Bathory. The drums are was like distant thunder (were they purposely buried in the mix, whether or not it achieves a grandoise effect!). The ever present acid rasps and bestial deep murmur, offset nicely against the loud

This is a remastering with some rerecording of guitar parts and completely new vocal recordings. Of the bands first 2 LP's ('91's "Self-Titled" debut and '92's "Night Of The Stormrider"), along side a couple trax from the third album 1995's "Burnt Offerings". This is the single disc North American release, with the Euro one being a two CD set with 21 instead of 15 tracks like we get. Now why is it that European releases always get the royal treatment with xtra content!?. Are we being snubbed?, Or, more likely, do they loyally support their shit in true form over there!!!?. I was excited about this as I had only heard "Burnt Offerings" and their lastest full-length "The Dark Opus". Were my expectations fullfilled?. YES and then some!. What we have is an amazing, emotional power/heavy metal with some unreal captivating gallops and twin guitar harmonies, that will have Maiden and Priest fans writhing in ecstasy!. Vocalist Matt Barlow, who was absent on the early material, steps up with a superb performance as he glides his way through all 15 catchy, heavy cuts that will go beyond satisfying the genre masses! JUDAS PRIEST -

"Jugulator" 1997 CD (BMG CANADA/CMC INT'L)

The mighty Priest return!. New vocalist "Ripper" Owens is in tow, after a very lengthy delay and the departure of the once great Rob Halford (who now resides in his own little goofy world of bad music). Judas Priest did surprise me. I kind of expected something like a cross of 'Painkiller" and "Stained Class" albums. But, to my surprise, things are heavier then ever! I mean, heavy as hell!. "Blood Stained," for example, has razor sharp heavy riffing, pinpoint stop-on-a-dime execution, back dropped with, and a nice drum pound. What can be said about "Ripper" Owens!?, He hits all the appropriate vocal ranges like a hot knife through butter!. Does he sounds similar to Rob Halford?, Yes, he does. But, after all, he was plucked from a J.P. cover band. Know what else?! He is almost better then Rob ever was!. I mean he does have some of his own qualities, but shit I don't know what else to say except damn this boy can fuckin' sing!. This album is a metal monster!. The only thing I can find lacking in this album is it misses some of old Priest melody; but, I think that will return next album cause this is the album they needed to make!.

ALBUM REVIEWS

DEMENTOR -

"Kill The Thought Of Christ" 1997 CD (Immortal Souls Productions)

From Immortal Souls in Slovakia comes Dementor. This relatively unknown band has been struggling to get noticed since before 1988, and it's about time that it did. Glen Benton aside, nobody serves up quite the same degree of brutal hatred and harsh discourse as Dementor. Driving guitar force pushes and pulls sounds from your ears at mid to high speed rates with rapid riff changes. While quite distorted it propagates quite a clear melody. Enticing and alluring, the fluctuating flow of the sound, accentuated by a very skillful bass track, keeps your attention and makes it tough to turn it off. Unfortunately on first listen, it's difficult to see the "beauty" in this album and it comes across as being rather boring death metal. I'm not quite sure why that is, but at some point driving around in my car - probably the fifth listen to the CD - it just clicked. Quite active on the drums, Pike brings to life the tempo and often somewhat weird time signatures. Not wanting to be left in the shadows he at times even manages to accompany the lead rather than just holding down the beat Some work needs to be done on the transitions however - they are often either lost in the mix or simply nonexistant. There is however quite a lot of quality death metal here, mixed alongside with a lot of standard death metal. Nonetheless Dementor has some very unique approaches to the music and "Kill The Thought Of Christ" comes across as a very good recording. -Neil St. Laurent

DISMEMBER "Misanthropic" + "Death Metal" 1997 MCD + CD (Nuclear Blast America/PHD Canada)

First off, I must say I am a longtime die hard fan of Dismember. They are, along with old Grave, the best death metal ever out of Sweden bar none!. Sound the death metal trumpet, striding defiantly and victoriously is Dismember with Unleashed at their side as the two lead the European charge!. Man oh man, this new material fucking kicks! It is like a beautiful cross between the all out heavy extremity of the debut "Like An Everflowing Stream" and the brutally groovy and harmonic "Massive Killing Capacity", leaving nothing but chaos and bust ear drums in it's wake!. What's even more is on the MCD, they bust out an old Autopsy cover song "Pagan Saviour", a great in-your-face job too! Just when I thought it was impossible for this band to any more endeared to me than they already are, they do an Autopsy tune!. You guys fucking rule!. For the uniniated, Dismember play brutal death metal at break neck speeds with stop-on-a-dime precision and emotional feel, killer catchiness and superb semi-understandable growls. All this in one serious explosive package that has been honed to razor sharp clarity. This will knock you on your ass!!.

INCANTATION "The Forsaken Mourning Of Angelic
Anguish" 1997 CD
(Relapse Records)



I have always liked Incantation and have always said in past reviews of their past material in other mags that Incantation are a good band who, with a little more focus and maturity, will reach their potential and become a great band. Well, I think with this release they have taken a large step towards my vision of them!. Original (i.e.former) vocalist, Craig Pillard, is employed on here as a session vocalist, as he rips his lungs through the 11 trax on tap. The riffing reminds me a lot of '80's style speed metal, but still has a nice brutal tinge of early '90's chainsaw down tuned plowing. Incantation are a driving band sorta like a juggernaut slowly building steam, battering your skull with drum blasts, yet finessing their way through with some great soloing, flowing riffs. Your only hope of warning being the battle growls you hear just before Incantation run right through you. This is an excellent album. But, mark my words, their future output is gonna floor you!.



PATHOLOGY STENCH "Gluttony" 1997 CD (Immortal Souls Productions)

It appears as though extreme bands are beginning to run out of decent available names; what exactly is a pathology stench? Even though I'm a big fan of death metal, it is getting harder and harder to be impressed by the vast number of death bands that are out there, especially those leaning towards the old school teachings. Too much of it is unoriginal lifeless crap. Fortunately with Pathology Stench's "Gluttony" I can find originality and a generally energetic sound. One thing that immediately stands out on "Gluttony" is a very clean production. Each track maintains its own richness while at the same time blending to the overall music. I often find myself complaining about the mixing of an album, but not in this case; the levels of each track in the mix do vary quite a bit, but always in a manner to add to the richness of the sound, not to detract from it. The credits don't mention an engineer or producer, so we can assume that at least one of the band members has some impressive talent in this area. The music

for the most part hinges on the guitar work of Lubo. While no individual riff is very complex, the song structure is achieved by the integration of several riffs and their transitions. The energy of the sound comes directly from the guitars. It is kind of hard to describe but each guitar riff contains its own driving force and when combined together the effect is very extreme. There is a certain degree of technical mastery that has to be admired in guitar fare. While the hinge of the music may be the guitars, the other elements are lost certainly not to be left out. Indeed in "I Believe Indians" there is a brilliant tradeoff from guitar to bass in the flow. At times the guitar actually loses its power and is taken over by nothing over than the requisite death metal blast beats. While the very low end, occupied by the double bass and bass, doesn't have the opportunity to shine through, it maintains a very solid foundation for the music. Overall the music is very strong. In the end it may really be the wonderful production job on "Gluttony" that makes the sound so appealing. With a strong focus on the guitars, and their level of energy, the mixing of all components provides a very tight recording that is technically pleasing. Immortal Souls Productions has a decent distribution channel, so Pathology Stench shouldn't be too hard to find, and you should definitely be looking. -Neil St. Laurent c/o Báro Barancík, Tulská 16, 974 01 Banská Bystrica, SLOVAKIA.

ESOTERIC "The Pernicious Enigma" 1997 Double

CD (Aesthetic Death Recs.) Esoteric is a band that is very heavy and immense, almost purely in a dark atmospherically trippy way. I am not talking about just plain old boring ambient/trance/synth garbage. No! They are so much more than that...much deeper then those bands could ever hope to be! Esoteric employ a whole array of instruments, but use the guitar and drums as the main thread of the weaved magical, and all encompassing world of aggression and somber sadness. This release is their 2nd label release and the first in 1994 was also a double CD album. Between the two discs present, we have close to two hours of velvet soundscape. Most tracks weigh in between the ten and twenty minute marks; and, most have vocals - but never stand out from the music, instead blending in and becoming just one of the instruments of the musical whole. The music is very heavily emotional and introspective in a very brooding and surrealistic way. Though not the same style exactly, for me Esoteric triumph where bands like My Dying Bride, Paradise Lost, and Therion have failed. Esoteric will touch every part of your inner workings, leaving you mentally naked as they peel back every layer of your subconscious. DECEASED -

"Fearless Undead Machines" 1997 CD (Relapse Records)

At a time when even I thought it wasn't possible to do pure power metal and have something

interesting, Deceased comes across with potentially the best guitar driven speed metal in a very long time. Right from the start, the first track "The Silent Creature" delivers some very original sounding guitar work. Mark Adams and Mike Smith simply never let up with their driving stringed assault. The solos are somewhat slower than the rest; they engage themselves in some more intricate patterns than the break-neck speed of the remainder of the album would allow. A pleasant interlude, "Contamination", follows the first track and basically sums up the twisted B-rated horror movie theme of the album. Song after song of the living dead walking the earth and killing the living are to follow this eerily

melodious introduction. And backing the guitars - The drums pound away relentlessly, complete with double-bass rumbling and thundering blast beats that add to the already deep music. Mike Bossier manages to capture the grandeur of the drums and to mix it such that it accentuates the guitars without being overwhelming and without being lost in the mix. In summary, this album is truly excellence in guitars. If you haven't heard any good power metal

since 1989, then this album will be sure to please you. Also, I'm not sure what it is, but this album has a death metal feel to it; any extremist out there should derive great enjoyment from "Fearless Undead Machines".

"Glory To The Brave" 1997 CD (NBA/PHD Canada)

Arrrggghh!! Classic power/speed metal in the vein of old bands like Halloween, Manowar, Iron Maiden, Grave Digger and so on. With members in bands such as In Flames and Dark Tranquility, you just know the musicianship is right up there. The performances really are solid, concise, and at times stunningly beautiful. Vocalist Jaocim Cans is a quite a find! His silky voice floats through the music with immense emotion and varied range. The metal spirit reigns supreme with great tracks such as "The Dragon Lies Bleeding", "The Metal Age", "Child Of The Damned" and "Steel Meets Steel".

The twin guitar harmonies are catchy as hell, and awe inspiring in their flawless brilliance!. Is there possibly anything bad to say about this album?. Not really, except Hammerfall sounds almost too much like all of their heroes and need to in the future, put their own twist on things and grab an identity they can call theirs. 
SACRAMENTUM "The Coming Of Chaos" 1997 CD (Century Media Records)

Oh, yes! Now just how many quality bands can Sweden spit out before the well finally runs dry!?. Sacramentum appear with their second full-length (first on Adipocere records), in which they summon the powers of darkness and fury through their instruments. Sacramentum is defined as "Satan's oath of allegiance rendered in crimson script, a decision of free will and uninhibited mind", no special reason for telling you that it just sounds cool doesn't it!?. "The Coming Of Chaos" is one neatly spun web of intense black/death metal sickness. You know what you are dealing with straight off when opener "Dreamdeath" spews forth with breakneck speed matched step for step by heavy riffing and a great chorus belted out with extremity and feeling, by bassist/vocalist Nisse Karlen. The production job handled by the godly lead guitarist for King Diamond Andy Laroque at his Los Angered studios is crisp and clear. Sacramentum are very adept at writing fast, intricate, and heavy songs while never losing intensity and never being scared to slow things up for a moment or two for short periods to really pound things home. I can recommend you check out this razor sharp band and hail in the entrance of the final chaos to follow!.



VISION OF DISORDER "Vision Of Disorder" 1997 CD (Roadrunner Records)

HOLY FUCK! HOLY SHIT! This is the best debut I have heard since Machine Head's "Burn My Eyes" lit a fire under my ass in 1994. These New Jersey hardcore lads have really got their shit together!!!! I thought my CD player was skipping after the break-neck fast tempo changes.
